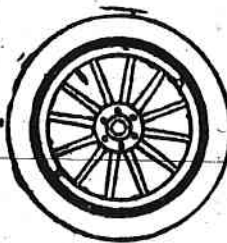
AUTO SHOW WEEK OPENS WITH PARADE

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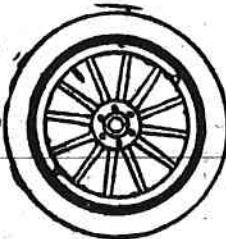

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National Chairman
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All Indianapolis will turn its eyes on the automobile today. Auto show week will begin with a flourish that indicates it will be the most successful in the history of the trade.

Garages clad in a riot of gay plumage will be thrown open to the public, entertainments designed to concentrate the attention of the public on the auto will be given, and the city will be crowded with thousands of visiting autoists, the whole forming a joyous reunion of the Indiana devotees of the motor car. Better still, the weather man has entered into the spirit of the occasion.

The Indianapolis Automobile Trade Association, under the auspices of which the opening is held, has made much more elaborate plans for the affair than ever were made before.

For two or three days the dealers have been decorating their places of business, which will be thrown open to public inspection this morning. They have all been made attractive, and care will be taken that all visitors will be entertained.

Parade at 2 O'clock.

The real opening of the show will be the parade, which will start at 2 o'clock this afternoon. In it will be hundreds of cars. All of the Indianapolis dealers and manufacturers will have cars in line, and indications are that invitations extended to out-of-town autoists will bring in hundreds more.

The Star's offer of a beautiful silver cup to the city or club outside of Indianapolis that has the largest number of cars in the parade has greatly increased interest in the parade, which is expected to prove an impressive demonstration of the affections of the public for the auto.

This event is expected to go a long way toward showing that the motor car is rapidly growing in public favor, instead of having reached the zenith of its popularity. There are expected to be many more cars in the parade today than in former parades. Again, the dealers will be able to show more attractive machines than they ever did before. Between parades, contests and exhibitions the opening will well occupy the time between today and Saturday evening, when it closes.

Must Register at Star Office.

Large delegations from Muncie, Anderson, Lafayette, Evansville and Bloomington and other cities are expected to arrive in the city bright and early this morning, all determined to make a gallant bid for The Star trophy. The entries are very large, and some exciting contests are expected, especially in the third event, which is for cars listing over \$1,800 and up to \$2,750.

All the cars that have entered have been tried out daily, and good time has been made in each instance. The differences in time, in most cases, is a fraction of a second, and should the good work be kept up some record-breaking climbs will be made. The climb beyond a doubt will be spectacular, as the machines have a stretch of nearly 100 yards in which to get a flying start before encountering the real grade.

The course is exactly four-tenths of a mile long, and the best time made up to date is thirty-eight seconds. Six events are on the afternoon's program. Visiting enthusiasts, as well as local ones, are sure to witness these contests.

All contestants will leave the Circle at 9:30, an early start being thought advisable, as all events will be started promptly on time. Each car will carry a complement of passengers.

Special Events at Garages.

On the two following days the various dealers will have several special events at their garages, which will attract the autoists to these headquarters.

Sales last week were larger than at any previous time this year. This indicates that Indianapolis folks will be heavy buyers of automobiles this season.

Friday will see the final contests of the week, the novelty part of the program being booked for the afternoon. These contests for supremacy will be held on Capitol avenue between Vermont and Michigan streets. Four events will have the boards.

The week, which promises to be a great success, will be brought to a close Saturday night with a dinner at the Grand Hotel.
