Resener Breaks Course Record at Highland in Practice for Meet Opening Tomorrow.

DIDDEL TO PLAY FOR THE CRAWFORDSVILLE CLUB

Simpson of Terre Haute Wins Followers by Form—Gossip of the Links.

WITH the name of Robert Resener, state and city champion, among the entrants for the Central Golf Association tournament, the hopes of Indianapolis capturing the title of the biggest golfing event ever held in Indiana have been increased some hundred-fold. Until last evening, when the total list of entries were in and the pairings made, it was not known that the state champion was going to be among the competitors in the championship play which will begin tomorrow morning over the course of the Highland Golf Club.

Under ordinary conditions, Resener would carry with him the confidence of his supporters, but at this time this confidence is doubly well founded, as the Indiana title holder played the best golf of his life yesterday, breaking the Highland course record by two strokes.
