BARS JOHNSON IN AUTO RACE

California Motor Association will Not Permit Champion to Compete.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., August 30.—John-
son, world's champion and auto speed
maniac, will not drive a car in the forth-
coming 300-mile automobile race at Tan-
foran track. A report gained circulation
in San Francisco to the effect that John-
son had entered a car in the contest for
the \$2,500 Hotel St. Francis trophy, and
that he would drive it himself.

The story is denied by Charles S.
Baughner, president of the California
Motor Racing Association, under whose
auspices the race is run. Mr. Baughner
said:

"There is no truth in the report that
Johnson has entered a car in the race,
nor has he made application to do so,
although I have been reliably informed
that he was contemplating such action.
Should he do so the application will be
rejected. The black champion will not be
permitted to secure notoriety or free ad-
vertising at the expense of the associa-
tion. If Johnson wants speed let him hire
a track and run his head off."

FIVE DIXIE PLAYERS SOLD.

Small Number of Southern Leaguers Bought by Majors.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., August 30.—Five
Southern League players will receive try-
outs by major league managers this fall
or next spring, according to an official an-
nouncement by President Kavanaugh,
showing the purchases. They are: Pitcher
Atkins, bought from Atlanta by Phila-
delphia Americans; pitcher Lively, by
Philadelphia Americans, from Montgom-
ery; catcher Casey, by Detroit, from Lit-
tle Rock, and pitcher Lellvelt and out-
fielder Wheat, the former bought by De-
troit and the latter by Brooklyn. Other
