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and Racing Is Best Seen in
City in Years.

A fair sized crowd of lovers of auto races gathered at the Fair Grounds yes-

The great event of the day was the 100-mile race for stock stripped cars and in this event a new record was established for the distance on a circular track, "Jap" Clemens, driving a National car, covering the distance in 1 hour 53 minutes and 24 seconds. This race, almost five

During the running of this race the only accident of the afternoon occurred.

Charles Merz, who was driving a National car, crashed through the fence at the west end of the track, taking ten yards of the fence with him and smashing one of the front wheels of his car. Merz had been running neck and neck with Clemens for eighty miles when tire troubles first made their appearance. The machine was stopped long enough to make repairs and then his car was sent away again. While rounding into the stretch on his ninety-fifth mile, going at the rate of fifty miles an hour, one of the rear tires of the machine exploded and unable to gain control of the racer it made a bee line for the fence and before the crowd could grasp what had occurred Merz was on his feet and was making his way up the stretch to the judges' stand.

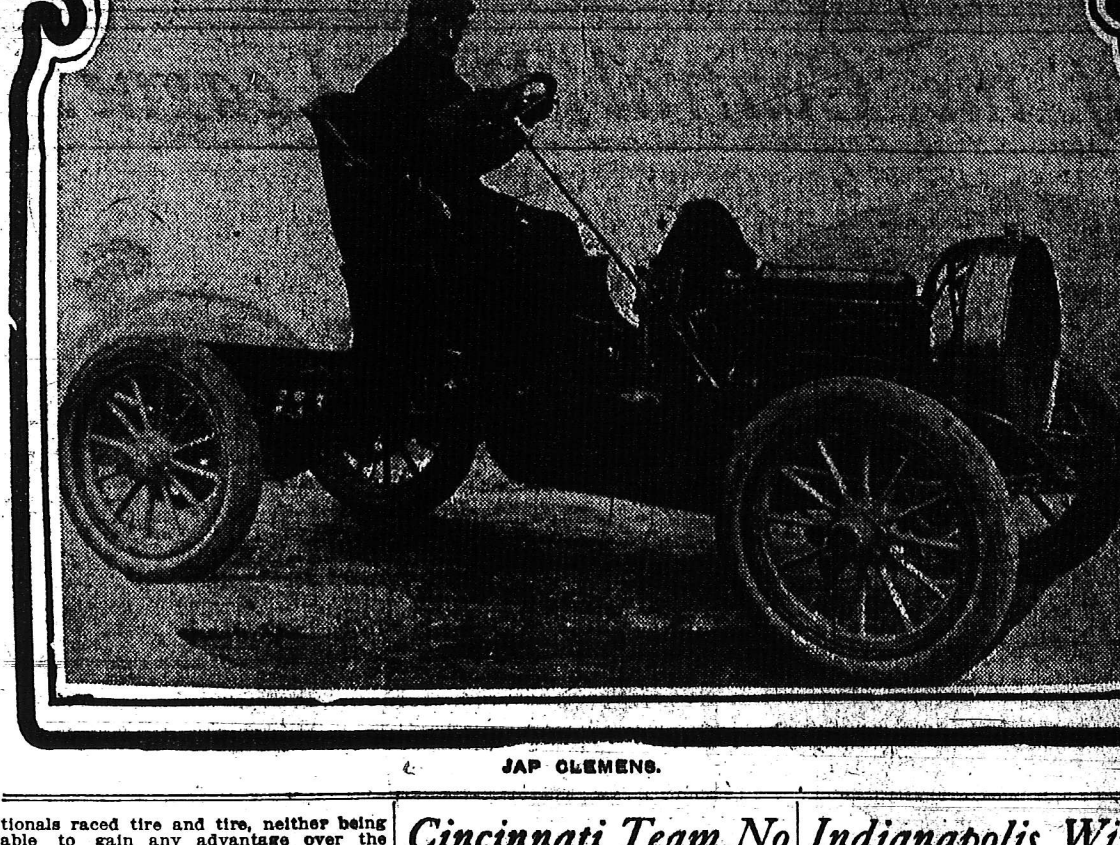
MERZ GOES THROUGH FENCE.

When the crash came Merz stuck by his machine and fortunately it remained right side up, thus saving him from terrible injuries that would undoubtedly have resulted had it turned turtle. This

the mishap, however, did not ma

an impression upon the iron nerves of the youthful driver and he appeared in all the rest of the events of the afternoon. After repairs to his car were completed, a distinct feature of the program was the exhibition five miles by Carl Fisher in his Premier racer built especially for the Vanderbilt cup race, but which was not started because of being overweight. Mr. Fisher drove the racer in fearless style and although he was unable to shatter any records he reeled off five miles at the rate of less than one minute one and one-fifth seconds, a rate of about fifty-nine miles an hour. The machine is a model of beauty and Mr. Fisher expects to capture some interesting races with it this

The day was almost ideal for the racing although toward the latter part of the afternoon the sun sneaked behind a cloud as it has done on various and sundry occasions when the managers have started to hold the meet, and during the running of the last races the drivers suffered to some extent from the cold. The track was as smooth as glass and was in shape for

able to gain any advantage over the other. In the back stretch it looked at times as if but one car was making the race. This same-neck-and-neck effort continued until Merz had tire troubles, and then it was all Clemens to the finish. The driving of Clemens and Merz was the best that has been seen in this city in some time, both being decidedly of the fearless description.

Clemens and Merz had another neck-and-neck race in the five-mile open. In this event Merz took the aggressive and had his engine working before Clemens could get his in operation, and in the

start the former jumped into a ten-yard lead, which he maintained until the stretch of the fifth mile, where Clemens moved up to his front axle and the two finished not three feet apart.

HUMOROUS FEATURE.

The humorous feature of the afternoon proved to be the three-mile event for touring cars carrying three persons, each passenger to dismount from the car at

quarter pole. This was

Merz, but only after the most trying of circumstances. For the first mile Merz was unable to stop his car immediately at the quarter-poles, and invariably had to back back to follow his passengers to the dismount line. Following the lead by Allison, led in this race for several miles, but engine troubles soon caused this contestant to drop back in the luck.

The closing event of the afternoon's program was the five-mile handicap for cars selected by the judges on their performances to go against the Premier-racer driven by Carl Fisher. Fisher was started at scratch, the two Nationals were handicapped a distance of 55 seconds and the Premier, McCaskey, was 15 seconds. This event was bitterly fought, but one by one Fisher overtook the cars, and in the stretch overcame the lead of Merz and won by a yard in one of the most sensational of finishes.
