Speed of Undefeated Heavyweight  
Revelation to Admirers—Gotch  
Fails to Throw Olson.

Has James J. Jeffries "come back?" If you leave it to a vote of all the people that could get into Tomlinson Hall last night to see the undefeated champion pull off his training exhibition stunts the question is answered. Verily it looks as if the undefeated is in our midst.

When the big fellow crawled into the ring the crowd that packed the great auditorium cheered as one man. Then as he shed his bathrobe and stepped forth a clean-cut athlete it didn't take a mind reader to see that the enthusiastic admirers of the champion of champions had decided unanimously that Jeffries has come back—if he ever has been very far away.

This "if Jeffries can get into condition," etc., gag has been worked so hard ever since Jeffries began to make up his mind to fight Jack Johnson that there were men in the audience that expected to see a nice, big, rotund, wind-broken giant with a girth so great that his fighting trunks would hardly meet around him. The contrast between the real thing and the picture in the skeptics' minds' eye was so startling that it would be wasting time now to try to convince

#### Big Crowd Cheers Jeffries.

Then the crowd was tuned up for Jeffries. The big fellow is used to ovations and this publicity game does not appeal to him strongly, but he grinned with pleasure at the enthusiastic greeting he received last night.

He responded by giving an exhibition that repaid the faithful for their trouble in gaining admission to the crowded hall. His rope skipping stunt was a revelation to the spectators and his shadow boxing brought cheers from the crowd, which saw an imaginary foe fall every time Jeff shot out his arms.

But it was in his three-round boxing exhibition with Sam Berger that he went a long way toward convincing the doubting Thomases that he is not far from being the Jeffries of old. It is hardly fair to the work of Jack Johnson to compare the Jeffries exhibition with the bouts Johnson put up last week. Jeffries faced a man of more class than Johnson's sparring partners and the fact that Berger and Jeff have worked together for so long made it possible for them to stage a bout that looked ten times more like the real thing than anything Johnson did in his week of sparring. Still even the exhibitions showed the difference in the fighting style of the two heavyweights, and in the opinions of many, the difference in their class.

Jeffries performed like the natural born fighter he is, and, although he tried to hold himself in, he clouted Berger a couple of swats that almost sent him off his feet, and time after time made openings that in an honest-to-goodness scrap would have meant that Berger's block would be knocked off. Johnson showed he is fast and clever on defense, but in the speed department he did not have anything on Jeffries.

Gotch had Olson on the defensive throughout the fifteen minutes they fought over the mat, and although he got the local grappler in some tight places he was unable to pin him down. Gotch got in yesterday afternoon from Buffalo, where he lost a handicap match by failing to throw Zbyszco in an hour. Gotch and the Pole have been matched to wrestle straight falls in Chicago in the near future. Al Roberts of Carmel, formerly heavyweight wrestler, refereed all the wrestling matches.
