AUTOMOBILE RACE ACROSS DESERT NEARS DESTINATION

Los Angeles-Phoenix Run Brings Cars
Into Arizona With Unusual Records
to Several Makes.

AHRENBURG, Ariz., Nov. 7.—Five of
the ten cars that left Los Angeles on the
419-mile race across the desert to
Phoenix checked in here between noon and
3 o'clock today. The others are scattered
along the route or ditched.

Isotta Fras Chini, the Italian car, which
left Los Angeles first at 10 o'clock last
night, was the first arrival, 10:47 a. m.
The car covered the 243 miles of the
first leg of the journey in 12 hours 47
minutes. The Buick, ninth to start, gained
2 hours 40 minutes and now stands first
by 40 minutes in elapsed time.

The Pennsylvania, which left Los
Angeles third at 10:30, arrived here third
with an elapsed time of 14:19. The
Columbia, eighth to leave, checked in
fourth at 2:47 p. m., time 15:02. The
Studebaker arrived fifth at 3:06 p. m.,
time 15:51.

Used by Farmer to Hull Walnuts for

SHELBYVILLE, Ind., Nov. 7.—Jesse
Lenox, one of the best-known farmers in
Shelby Township, has a model way of hull-

Lenox carried them into the barnlot. He
proceeded to stamp them until they were
partly hulled, then he took a shovel and
piled them up. Next he poured a bucket
of cracked corn over the pile. Then he
turned the chickens into the lot to feed. The
fowls made for the pile of walnuts and
scratched and pecked among them until the
pile was torn down and every walnut was
hulled.
