

SECOND GAME.

Herbert Lyttle, the veteran automobile racer, who was seriously injured in the Long Island automobile derby race in the Riverhead-Mattituck meet yesterday, and James Bates, his mechanician, who was killed, narrowly escaped death in the 300-mile race at the recent meeting at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Lyttle's Apperson "Jack Rabbit," in the Indianapolis race, leaped from the track—and plunged into the soft earth at the side of the race course, but he and his mechanician escaped unhurt. The car was repaired and continued in the race until the National car, driven by Charles Merz, left the track killing William Kellym Morris the track, killing William Kellum, Merz's mechanician, and two spectators.

James Bates lived at Kokomo, where he leaves a widow and one child. Kellum's home also was at Kokomo. Bates, who formerly lived at Toledo, went with Lyttle to Kokomo last July when Lyttle began driving the Apperson car. He was 27 years old and had been with Lyttle two
