**FREDDIE HUYCK MAKES FASTEST MILE AT LOWELL**

**Chicago Boy Covers Distance on Motorcycle In 48 1-5 Seconds—De Rosier Rides Again.**

LOWELL, Mass., Sept. 11.—More than a score of motorcycles, handled by expert operators, hummed over a miniature Merrimac Valley course today in competition for the road championship of the country.

The breaking of standard records above the mile was not possible, owing to the fractional length of the curtailed course. This fact, however, established records for such distances as 9.6 miles, 19.2 miles and 51.8 miles. These will be accepted as such, it is understood.

The best mile of the day was that of 48 1-5 seconds, made by Freddie Huyck of Chicago, driving an Indian machine. This performance gave him the Speed King trophy for the fastest mile on a straight-away with a flying start.

The course used measured 3.2 miles. The fastest time made over this was 3:28 4-5 by Stanley Kellogg of New York in a 9 3-5-mile race, driving a Merkel machine.

What had been expected to be the feature event of the day—that of the 19.2-mile free-for-all, proved to be an easy victory for Jake De Rosier of Springfield. He had but two competitors, one of whom was Ed Lingenfelder of Alhambra, Cal., present champion. The Californian Soreigh machine broke down and he tried to continue the race in a Domestic cycle, and was disqualified. Summary:
