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LOWELL ROAD RACE MAY NOT BE RUN THIS YEAR

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BOSTON, February 19.—Promoters of the annual Lowell road race find it a losing proposition, and as a result it will in all probability be abandoned this year. The project fails to arouse any enthusiasm in the New England district, and although President John O. Heinze, of the Lowell Automobile Club, has not yet officially announced the abandonment of the race it is understood that the event will be taken off the automobile calendar. Two years ago the financial loss was very large, but notwithstanding this Mr. Heinze early last winter announced that a large and more elaborate automobile carnival would be held the next fall. He worked untiringly, and with the aid of the Automobile Association of America obtained all the entries necessary to make the meet the greatest in the country. From a sporting standpoint it was all that could be desired, but the financial part was again a failure.

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It will be a great disappointment to the race drivers of the country to learn that the Lowell races will be abandoned, for they liked the course and the enthusiasm displayed in racing by the people of this part of the country. The expenditures necessary to build grand stands, dress the roadbed, erect fences, and a hundred other details is more than can be realized at the gate, and unless some real enthusiast is kind enough to come forward with money to help pay for these constructions it certainly does not look now as though this section of the country would see exciting automobile races this year.

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
