"How to define the stock car and have stock car events for bona fide stock chassis cars is one of the worries of the and the manufacturer, the promoter sport-loving public," declares Howard Marmon of the Nordyke & Marmon Company. That there are many reasons why the public should be skeptical about many of the present so-called stock cars that are racing there can be no denying, as their examination at a race meet naturally must be of a character which is more or less superficial. Of course, it is to be expected that the examination will show that the cylinders are of the necessary displacement, that the parts are the same as are purchased by the public, but it is impossible to tell if the parts are of chrome nickel steel or some other specially treated process when the manufacturer may not be selling that quality to the public and it is therein that fraud may be easily practiced.

#### Reporter Hits Mark.

"At the recent Atlanta races one of the facetious reporters hit the mark closely when he stated: There would be more cars ready for the Speedway races but for the fact that the various factories have not had time to prepare their racing cars for the stock chassis events.


"If the cars are stock chassis why is it necessary to have time to prepare them? Of course, it takes time to put a special arrangement to carry fuel on a racing car and to pipe it for such a process in accordance with the rules, to build racing seats and other features not on stock cars and to put on several coats of special colored paint which may designate a racing car from the regular stock runabouts. But this should be only a matter of a couple of weeks at the most.

"I understand a manufacturer who real-

ly is selling and overselling his product has a hard time selecting from the cars ready for shipment half a dozen which he can retain for his racing team when there is a daily demand that he make shipments or cancel orders, but still there should be a limit even to this. So I say ten to fifteen days should enable any factory to prepare for racing if that factory desires to race with strictly stock stuff, and I certainly would be willing to have selling races under conditions that we would have from two to three weeks to run through new team cars. I would make the time much less than that were it not for the fact that we are often booked for two or three meets in quick succession, and it would be impossible, for example, to sell Harroun's car today if he had a meet to attend in five or six days.
