

# INS AVIATION PRIZES REMAIN IN RACING GAME

## IRANE GETS FOUR FIRSTS MARMONS LAY 1911 PLANS

AMERICAN AVIATOR, J. ARMSTRONG DREXEL, TAKES SECOND PLACE AT MEET JUST ENDED IN BOURNEMOUTH, ENGLAND.

BOURNEMOUTH, England, July 17.—In Morane, the French aviator, has been officially awarded the first prizes at a meeting just ended for speed, altitude, flight and general merit. J. Armstrong Drexel, son of Anthony Drexel, comes out as the highest prize winner, while Ham White, the English aviator, takes second place.

Ascends 4,100 Feet.

Iran reached an altitude of 4,100 feet in covering the distance of eighteen miles around the Needles Lighthouse and in twenty-five minutes. In the condition of Alan Boyle, son of Earl of Glasgow, who was injured yesterday while making a flight here, was considered alarming today by the attending physicians. Boyle's monoplane fell to a considerable height, and the aviator was picked up unconscious. He suffered from concussion of the brain, which did not yield to treatment.

### FORMS WAR BALLOON COMPANY.

Count von Moltke Leads Organization for Building Air Cruisers. RAEFRATH, Rhenish Prussia, July 17.—The Lower Rhine Company, with \$1,000,000 capital, for the construction of air cruisers especially fitted for dropping explosives, has been formed under the leadership of Count von Moltke. Dirigible balloons will be built, about 300 feet in diameter and having a capacity of 14,300 cubic meters of gas and a carrying power of more than five tons. The framework of the vessels will consist of wooden stays, covered with rubber and silk. The central shaft, which will be armored, will have a perpendicular shaft for shooting projectiles.

### AERONAUT HAS SHORT FALL.

Causes Partial Paralysis and Breaks Many Bones.

CLEVELAND, O., July 17.—In attempting to make a landing from his balloon today J. W. Dale, who had ascended from a height only twenty minutes before, became entangled with wires and fell twenty feet. From an injury inflicted on his head Dale is now paralyzed from his neck downward, his left arm and two fingers are broken, and his left wrist is dislocated.

### FLIES ACROSS SOUND.

Aviator Makes Distance of Four Miles.

HARROUN AND DAWSON WILL DRIVE IN IMPORTANT CONTEST THIS SEASON, ENDING WITH GRAND PRIZE EVENT.

Howard Marmon, who has charge of the Marmon racing team, is laying his plans for the automobile racing season for next year. It has been less than a year ago since the Marmon cars made their first appearance in speed contests, and Mr. Marmon said last night the record of the cars has been such that he expects to take part in all the important speed events yet to be held this year, and the Marmon cars will be prepared for the big events next year.

Marmon cars were first sent into speed contests at the August meeting at the Speedway last year. The fact that the cars since that time have finished in every contest in which they have started has been a source of pride to Mr. Marmon, and the cars have been entered in the Elgin road race next month and the Speedway races in September, the Lowell Cup race in September and the Vanderbilt and the Grand Prize in October.

### Develop Marmon Pilots.

The Marmon people are proud of the fact that the cars not only have made a great showing in less than a year, but were piloted to victory by drivers unknown to fame before the Marmon cars were entered in races. Ray Harroun and Joe Dawson are graduates of the experimental rooms at the Marmon factory, and when they started in the races they were unknown to fame, but they knew their cars.

The Marmon has been noted for the fact that it has less piston displacement than any car entered in the event.

Entered in class B, events division 4 for cars of 301 to 450 inches piston displacement, and with the lowest displacement even in this class, Marmon cars have won the Cobe Cup, the Wheeler-Schepler trophy and other events for any cars of 600 inches piston displacement and less, thereby going out of their class to perform in those contests.

In the notable events that Harroun and Dawson have won they have seldom started at the start, but at the end of the bitter fight and hard finish they have noosed their rivals out by consistent and steady work.
