## Rain Puts Damper on Grand Circuit Program

Detroit, Mich., July 30.—A drizzling rain which set in at noon Thursday was the cause of the \$10,000 M. & M. stake, the feature event of the Grand Circuit meeting at the fair grounds being postponed until today. Four other races were finished in spite of the heavy rain and heavy track, but the drivers of the M. and M. horses protested so vigorously to the judges against starting the classic that the order of the program was changed at the last minute, after the horses had been warmed up, and the event carried over.

The 2:10 trot was the feature event of a rainy afternoon, this going to the favorite, Guy Nella, who was a \$50 to \$65 favorite against the field. The first heat found the New York owned mare, Lulu Lumine, in front, her first winning heat on the big ring, but in the next three heats the mare from the Geers stable was an easy winner.

Tou Murphy had a field day, landing the 2:22 pace, in which one heat was raced on Tuesday, with the bay mare Jean, who was far the best of the field, and the 2:15 pace with the four-year-old colt, Peter Farrer, who also outclassed his field. 2:11 paces went the limit of five heats, Walter Cox winning with Clara Walker, Geers' Hal Conner displayed more speed than any of the starters, but bad breaks spoiled his chances.

Auction pools were sold on the M. & M. Lee A. worthy selling favorite at \$1,000, Peter Scott bringing \$225, Worthy Prince and King Clausen selling at \$200 each, Peter McCormick \$150, Bonington \$40 and Duchess, Albalonia, Wilgo, Miss Directed and Lucile Spier in the field at \$50.

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
