# SEEKS SANCTIONS FOR MOTOR RACES

E. A. Moross Goes to New York  
to Confer With Contest  
Board of A. A. A.

## PROPOSES AMATEUR EVENT

Speedway Director Believes Inter-  
national Private Owners' Con-  
test Will Be Held.

Something new in the form of motor car events will add to the long list of gasoline performances scheduled for the Indianapolis Motor Speedway this season if the plans of E. A. Moross, director of the contests, carry.

Mr. Moross left last night for New York for several purposes, among them to arrange for the first international amateur automobile race to be held in Indianapolis this summer. Because of friction between the A. A. A. and the A. C. A., foreign cars can not be driven in sanctioned races in this country by foreign drivers. This has made it almost impossible for the motor loving public in general to see what these foreign speed creations can do. By pulling off a race for private owners of foreign cars these machines can be brought before the public.

The race proposed will be for the international amateur world's championship honors. A tentative list of drivers who Mr. Moross declares he can induce to bring their cars here are W. K. Vanderbilt Jr., in a Renault; W. Clifford Earp, in a Napier; W. Gould Brockaw, owner of several foreign makes; H. Levy, in a Hotchkiss; Harry Harkness, in a

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### Emphasizes Chassis Events.

These men, with others, such as Eddie Hernes of Chicago, with a Fiat, would compose a splendid array of amateur owners of foreign cars. There are plenty of private owners of American-made cars who will enter. Such a race would add much to the interest and variety of the events here this season.

Of course, the local Speedway promoters believe that American stock chassis races are what the public is most interested in and will place stress on such events, but at the same time want to include everything that runs on four wheels in the Speedway calendar of contests.

The prime motive for Mr. Moross's trip to New York is to confer with the contest board of the A. A. A. and try to procure sanctions for all of the holiday dates that have been asked for. Oppositions to these dates are being registered with the board by other race promoters. These will be met by the argument that the local track was the first in the field, cost the most money and set the pace for the entire country, and, therefore, deserves special consideration. Not only that, but the Atlanta track asks for early and late meets, and, as they will be through with their spring contests after April, Mr. Moross believes he will have a clear field. He asks for Memorial day, July 4, July 23, Aug. 12, Sept. 2 and Oct. 7. Each meet with run for three or four days. Charles Sedwick, Indiana representative for the A. A. A., will urge the Speedway's claim to the best dates of the season.

The A. A. A. announced that it will limit this year's sanctions to 100 meets for the purpose of trying to stop the minor mile track events, which it is alleged are run by private concerns and do not give all a chance. These "barnstormers" are scheduled to be ruled out of sanctioned events hereafter.

### Seeks Western Classic.

From New York Mr. Moross, according to the arrangements of the officers of the Speedway, will go to the Chicago Automobile Show, and there attempt to land the Cobe Trophy race for the local Speedway. Chicago is planning to build a Speedway of its own, and wants to hold the big Western classic on it this spring.
