

# RIDERS ARRIVE FOR MOTORCYCLE RACES

Speed Merchants From Pacific  
Coast Will Enter National  
Events This Week.

## ENDURANCE RUN TOMORROW

Two Hundred Machines Will  
Leave Cleveland for Indian-  
apolis in Hard Grind.

The colony of speed merchants from all over the country here to take part in the national motorcycle races Friday and Saturday was increased yesterday with the arrival of three racers from the Pacific coast.

Eddie Lingenfelder, who holds more records than any other professional rider, headed the list. Lingenfelder arrived from Los Angeles yesterday afternoon. He is entered in the five and ten-mile professional events and will ride a seven-horse N. S. U.

Ray Seymour, the 17-year-old rider who has accomplished some sensational feats on a motorcycle, and "Fearless" Balke, two amateurs who are entered in some of the amateur events, also arrived from Los Angeles. #### Endurance Run Tomorrow.

About two hundred motorcyclists will leave Cleveland for Indianapolis Tuesday morning on what promises to be the largest endurance run up to the present date. When Chairman Hamilton of the endurance run committee of the F. A. M. left Indianapolis last Friday he took with him advance entries from seventeen different motorcycle factories, with a total of eighty-three entries, and it is only fair to expect that the entries that are in Cleveland, and the additional post entries, should swell this number to two hundred. On arrival in Indianapolis the national convention will be held. The Indiana Motorcyclists' Club has put in the field three candidates for national offices of the F. A. M. for the coming year. The name of President Charles Wyatt will be placed before the convention for the office of vice president. If he is elected to this position the Western headquarters of the F. A. M. will come to Indianapolis. The club will also place before the delegates the names of Harry Graff for treasurer of the national body and G. H. Hamilton for secretary of the national body.

#### Motor Speedway Ready.

The Indianapolis Motor Speedway is ready for the motorcycle race. Many of the local racing cars were out on the big track yesterday. Herbert Lytle, in an Apperson Jack Rabbit, speeded his car at the rate of seventy-six miles an hour and the Marmon and the Marion cars also tested the track. The inner course will be finished early this week and long before it is time to start the first motorcycle race the speedway will be in perfect shape. Many of the motorcycle riders who are now in the city will take their first trial spins over the track today.

Plans for the motorcycle races and the convention of the American Federation are now complete. The management of the speedway at a meeting yesterday decided not to permit the sale of intoxicating liquors on the grounds, but there will be restaurants and cafes, and soft drinks and other refreshments will be sold.

The Prest-O-Lite Company has contributed a special trophy for an event at the motorcycle races.
