WATSON GIVES TRAVIS HARD GOLF LINK RACE

Former National and International Champion Receives Fright of His Life.

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., May 7.—Walter Travis, former national and international champion, narrowly escaped defeat this afternoon in the annual tournament of the Garden City Golf Club at the hands of R. Watson of New York.

The only thing that saved Travis was the stymie with which he laid his competitor on the home hole. It was a full stymie resulting in a half, so an extra hole was necessary.

On the nineteenth Watson lost by flubbing his second into the great sand pit, where he got out only to lose the hole because Travis was well up toward the cup on his second. Travis led Watson all the way out but at the eleventh the match was square and again at the fifteenth. Watson's flubbing at the critical point was caused by nervousness in lifting his eye too quickly from the ball.

In the other match of the first division Albert Zeckel of Princeton beat Arden Robbins of St. Andrews one up after having Robbins three down three times. Clever putting enabled Zeckel to squeak through his veteran adversary. The final tomorrow will be between Travis and Zeckel.
