**MOTORCYCLISTS EXPECT
 BIG NATIONAL MEETING**

Expect Thousands of "Two-Wheeled Vis
 itors" Here During Race Conclave
 at Speedway.

From all indications, the 1909 national
 meet of the Federation of American Motor
 cyclists will be the biggest gathering of the
 adherents of the power-driven two wheelers
 which has ever been held in this country.

The executive committees of the F. A. M.
 have already put affairs in the hands of the
 Indianapolis Motorcycle Club. The motor
 cyclists of Indianapolis and the members of
 the club itself have already shown a great
 deal of enterprise and have the plans for
 the meet well under way.

G. H. Hamilton and George W. Stevens
 have been particularly energetic in their ef
 forts to see that every detail, however small
 it may be, gets attention.

All motorcyclists know that the annual
 meet of the F. A. M. is the event of the
 year in motorcycling. The F. A. M., na
 tional body governs the sport of motor
 cycling in America, and at the annual meet
 the most important championships are de
 cided. There is hardly any question but
 what the records will come tumbling during
 these championships, since the annual meet
 of the F. A. M. will be the first motorcycle
 meet held on the new Indianapolis Con
 course Speedway. Fisher, who has the
 Speedway matter in charge, advised Presi
 dent Ovington of the F. A. M. that, as far
 as he can see, the Speedway will be ready
 to use about the middle of July, in which
 case the national meet will be held very
 probably during the last week of July.

The F. A. M. meet in this city will be a
 big thing for motorcyclists, and will do
 very much toward increasing the popularity
 of the motorcycle in the middle West.
