MODELS FOR 1910 ON WAY TO

## HOOSIER MADE CARS IN LEAD

Indianapolis auto makers have been busy during the last week preparing their exhibits for the tenth international automobile show of the American Motorcar Manufacturers Association, which is scheduled to open at the Grand Central Palace, New York, on New Year's eve. Most of the shipments are now on the way. The Premier company's shipment was made resterday, and the exhibit will consist of five 1910 model cars, including a chassis. The Premier representatives, H. O. Smith, George Wiedely, R. W. Macy and Ray McNamara, will leave for New York, the first of next week. Representatives from the Boston and Philadelphia agencies will also be at the Fremier exhibit.

Nordyke & Marmon will be represented at the New York show by Howard and Walter Marmon and H. H. Rice. A duplicate of the Marmon exhibit has been placed in the local salesrooms at Meridian and New York streets. It consists of a touring car, a suburban four-passenger car, a snappy roadster and a chassis. The exhibit has attracted considerable attention during the week. The chassis is so arranged that every mechanical detail is open to view.

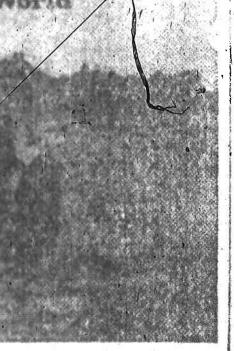
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The National Motor Vehicle Company will be represented by A. C. Newby, presidejat; George M. Dickson, J. M. Clarke, W. G. Wall, T. C. Whitcomb, James J. Hunt and John Altken. A National "40" toy tonneau, National "40," two-passenger speedway model and a chassis will be shown. A feature of the National exhibit will be a large showcase containing trophies won by National cars in road and track races. These include cups won in the recent races at Atlanta and New Orleans.

The Empire is another Indianapolis car that will make a place for itself in the motor world at the Pajace show. Models A and B and also auto parts will be shown. Factory representatives who will be in charge of the exhibit are R. H. Hassler and J. G. Wood. The Indianapolis shipments are now on the way and the representatives will follow early next wack.

At Madison Square Garden.

Three Indianapolis makers will be represented at the annual exhibit at Madison Square Garden, which will be held on the weak following the Palace show. Since the compromise of the Seldon patent controversy there is no real mark of distinction between the two shows and by the opening of another season it is predicted that both will be held under one roof.

The Waverley company, of Indianapolis, will have one of the largest exhibitions at this show. It will consist of a closed inside drive brougham, a two-passenger coupe, gentleman's Stanhope, a Victoria and a gentleman's runabout. In addition to these there will be shown the Waverley driving system, including gear and motor, nickle-plated controller and battery in operation. W. C. Johnson, R. A. Potts, T. W. Eigner, J. C. Henderson and H. H. Rice will be the factory representatives

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Three models will be exhibited at the garden show by the Marion Motor Car Company. They are the touring car, town car and roadster. Harry Stutz, Edward Sourbier and others from the sales force will be in charge.

The specifications show that there are twenty-seven different models selling under \$1,000, thirty-three models from \$1,000 to \$2,499, twenty-nine from \$2,500 to \$2,999, twentyfour from \$3,000 to \$3,999 and twenty-nine models selling for \$4,000 and above. In the commercial division there are eighty-six distinct models, embracing all manner of vehicles, such as light delivery, light and heavy trucks, ambulances, patrol wagons, sightseeing coaches, etc. The fact that there are thirty-three distinct models selling between \$1,000 and \$1,499 clearly shows that this is the popular-priced car, there are more makers devoting their interests to cars selling at that price than at any other.
