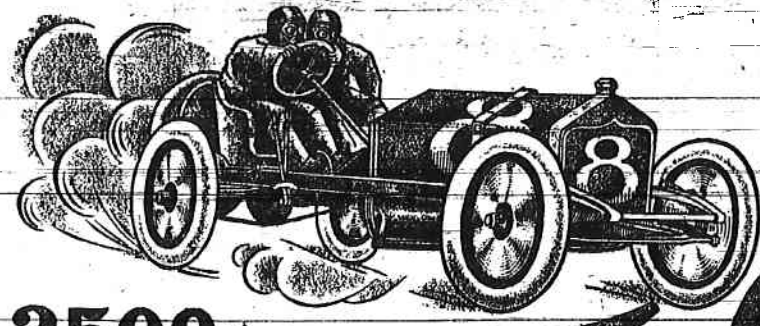

In five days' racing it broke a world's record, captured first place in four races, second in five and fourth in two. In each case where it captured place it was defeated either by another National or by a car of at least twice its power and price. The National "60" took three third places in free-for-alls, defeated only by foreign cars of much higher power and price. In one of these races it broke the world's record for ten miles.
