Two National stock cars rated at forty-
horse power, were shipped by the National
Motor Vehicle Company of this city last
night to Atlanta, where they will com-
pete for stock speed honors on the South-
ern Automobile Course during the meet
to be held May 5, 6 and 7. Johnny Aitken
and Tom Kincaid, the veteran National
drivers who achieved so many honors
last season with these fast stock cars,
will handle the big machines at the At-
lanta Speedway meet.

Aitken will have for his mechanician
Howard Wilcox, while Don Herr will as-
sist Kincaid. These men will leave for
the South Saturday night. They expect
to have the cars on the Speedway three
or four days before the meet to get ac-
well acquainted with the course. A. C.
Newby, head of the National Company,
expects to attend the meeting at Atlanta.
He has entered the powerful National
forties in the 200-mile events and many of
the shorter struggles.

The two stock cars which will go for
the honors at Atlanta have shown speed
on the local Speedway in practice, which
encourages Mr. Newby to believe that the
Nationals may be relied upon to perform
as marvelously as they did in 1909, when
they captured so many classics on track
and hill.
