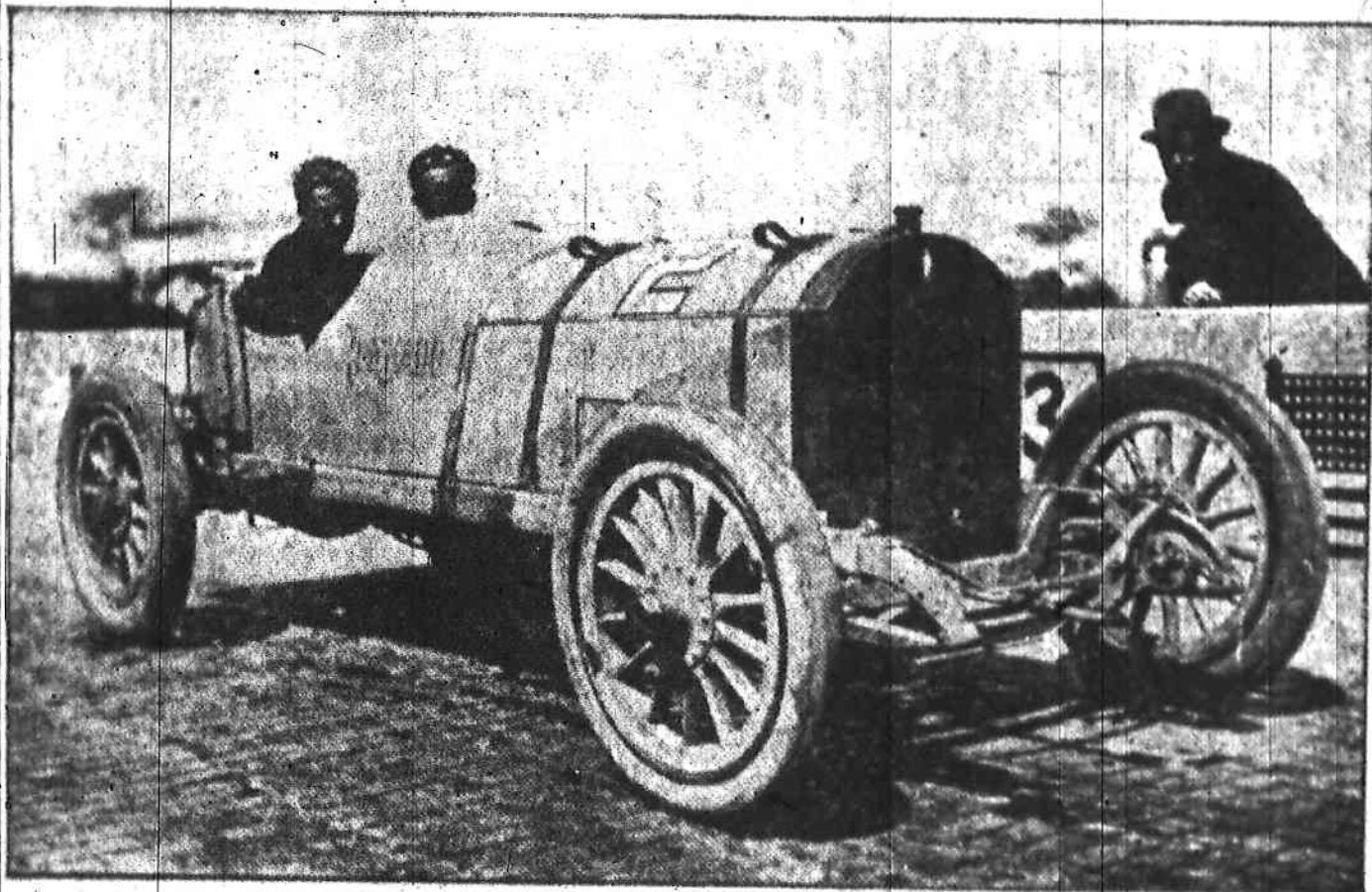


Clinton high schools will engage in a dual track and field meet here next Saturday afternoon. The Brazil Eagles and Sullivan baseball teams will play here Sunday.
