FROGLEGS IS FAVORITE IN KENTUCKY HANDICAP

MONDAY'S RACE TO BE RICHEST EVER RUN IN WEST.

DONERAIL HAS SUPPORTERS

(Special to The Indianapolis News)

LOUISVILLE, May 24.—The Kentucky Handicap, which will be run Monday afternoon as the feature of the opening of the Douglas park spring meeting will be the richest race ever run in Kentucky and the richest in the west since Chicago and St. Louis barred the turf. The Douglas Park Club added \$10,000. There were sixty nominations at \$50 each, which adds \$3,000. It costs \$150 more to start, so if ten go to the post, as seems probable, the total value will be \$14,500. Of this \$1,500 will go to the second horse, \$400 to the third and \$200 to the fourth, so the value to the winner will be about \$12,000.

The handicap is at a mile and a quarter, the same distance as the Kentucky Derby. It is for three-year-olds and upward however, while the Derby is limited to three-year-olds. According to the weights announced, Froglegs, J. W. Schorr's great four-year-old, will carry top weight, 124 pounds. He is the probable favorite. Recently he set a new world's mark for a mile and twenty yards at the Downs. Donerail, winner of the Kentucky Derby in the fastest time ever made for that race, is also a starter and with 112 pounds up, will be well supported.
