

FRENCH TEAM DUE IN INDIANAPOLIS SUNDAY

PEUGEOT PILOTS AND MECHANICIANS TO LIVE AT SPEEDWAY.

BUGS WILL WATCH RECORDS

Goux and Zuccarelli, pilots of the Peugeot team in the next five-hundred-mile race, together with their mechanics, Negli and Pianelli, accompanied by Charles Lafoux, editor of La Vie Automobile, the noted French automobile publication, left New York this morning, and are now on their way to Indianapolis, according to advice received from a member of the party at the speedway today. They are expected to arrive in Indianapolis tomorrow. They will be met at the station by Charles Redwick, manager of the speedway, Professor S. M. Pimiento, the race meet interpreter, and a number of other officials of the course, who will endeavor to make them feel at home as much as possible in their unaccustomed surroundings.

During their stay in this city they will reside at the race track, where they will be in charge of Captain Carpenter, of the speedway guards. Their cars are expected in Indianapolis about the middle of next week. Immediately upon their arrival workouts will begin. Then it will be that the bugs will get a chance to see whether a duplication of some of their recent performances on the Brooklands track, when they negotiated 105 miles 200 yards in an hour, is possible on the local saucer. The remainder of the foreign contingent, including Guyot, Crossman, Pillette and Trucco, is expected to sail from Havre either today or tomorrow. The entire outfit ought to be on hand at the speedway. It is thought, on the 15th or 20th of the month at the very latest.
