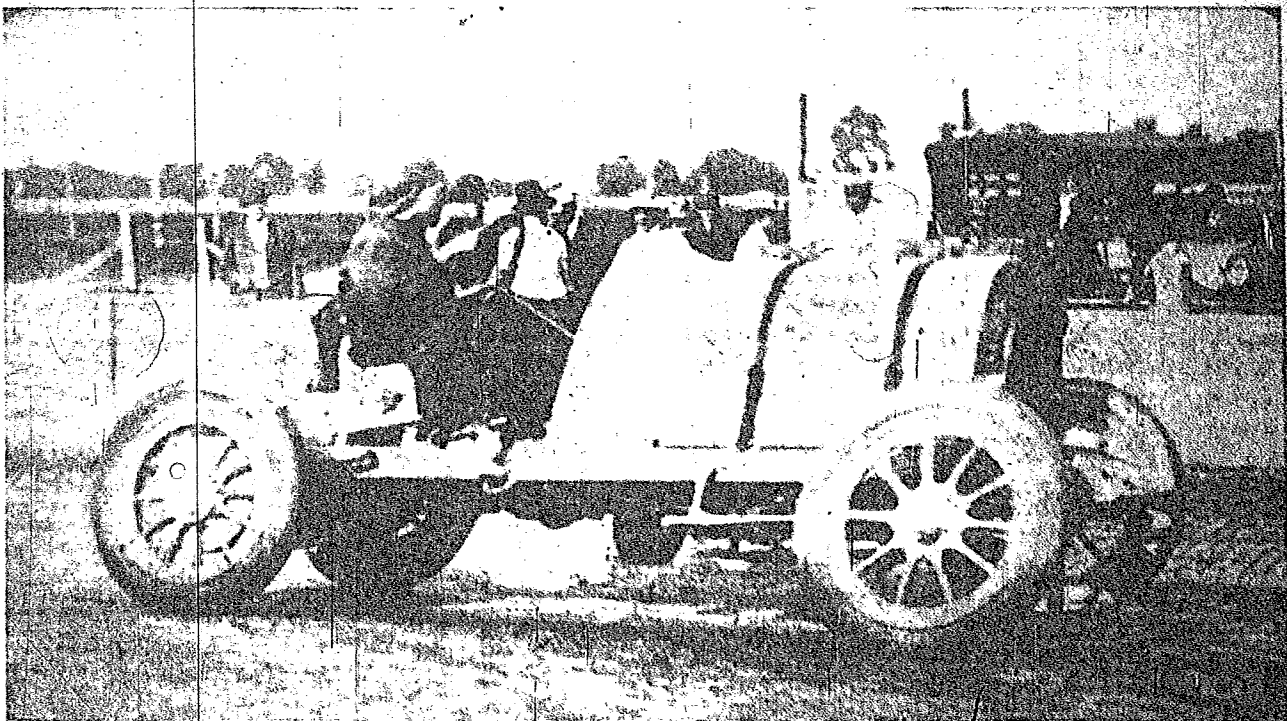


**DARK HORSE IN BIG SPEEDWAY RACE**



WILCOX IN GRAY FOX.

The first appearance on the speedway yesterday of Wilcox and his Indiana-made Gray Fox, shown in the above photograph, was the signal to applause among the hundreds of his friends who lined the track. It was thought at first that Cokey would let his mount out immediately. After a few laps, however, it was discovered that he was merely attempting to work in his motor. Wilcox expressed himself as highly pleased with the car's performance, as no excessive heat was evident at any of the friction points or the radiator, at the conclusion of the trial. In appearance and construction his machine resembles very much the Pope-Hartfords which formerly raced at the speedway. The chief differences are that a lighter rear axle and frame are being used, bringing the total weight of the car well below twenty-five hundred pounds. The Pops always totaled approximately thirty-five hundred. It is thought that this weight reduction will make the machine much faster than any of its predecessors, a speed of 110 miles an hour being considered perfectly within the limits of reason. After Wilcox finishes the tuning up and adjustment of his craft, its performances on the speedway will be watched with much interest. This is especially the case because of the many adherents he has locally. The brushes he will have with his former teammates, Herr and Mers, are expected to exceed any others in their fascination, as the three of them are all Indianapolis boys, with the same circle of friends and acquaintances. If any member of the trio should win it would instantly call for a celebration, at which the others would be guests of honor.

**Fair French Race Pilots Gain Favor at Speedway**

Advance photographs of Goux and Zuccarelli, the drivers of the Peugeot team, had engendered the belief that they were dark and swarthy. Their appearance on their arrival in the city yesterday belied such an impression. Goux particularly is the very antithesis of the southern European, being as pink cheeked and fair as a girl. Zuccarelli, though of stockier build, is no less distinguished for the delicacy of his complexion. Both look as if they had been fed on French pastry all their lives. Their eyes fairly sparkle with animation, while when they get on the subject of racing they become so excited they can barely control themselves. In education and breeding they are numbered among the best of France, carrying all the earmarks of the distinguished foreigner, chiefly his polish and unflinching courtesy. At the speedway yesterday they had everybody breaking his neck to doff his hat in imitation of their manner. For he it known in France it is just as much the custom for gentlemen to greet each other by tipping their hats as it is for them to salute ladies in this fashion. By virtue of their charm and reserve of manner, keen aggressiveness to learn and unflinching good nature, the Frenchmen are already favorites among all the Americans at the race course. Their sole defect is that they do not speak English. This, however, they propose to rectify immediately, taking lessons from S. M. Philmonta, the speedway interpreter, during the nights they are quartered at the track.

**Ty Cobb Could Draw Only \$10 a Week in Case of Injury**

LANSING, Mich., May 15.—Should Ty Cobb, world's champion batsman and star player of the Detroit baseball team, be injured while under contract with President Navin, of the Tigers, he would be entitled to only \$10 a week compensation, according to information received here. President Navin has notified the industrial board of his intention to place all his players under the provisions of the state workmen's compensation law. Cobb is supposed to draw a salary of about \$2,000 a month, or \$500 a week. If injured he ordinarily would receive his full salary while on the bench. But under the state law Cobb's salary would not be paid. The law provides that when an employe is disabled he must be paid "an amount equal to one-half his weekly wage, not to exceed \$10 a week."
