Crowds Gather at St. Louis to Watch
Airship Flights.

ST. LOUIS, October 7.—Thousands of
spectators thronged the natural amphitheater near art hall, in Forest park, to-
day to see what were scheduled to be
the first aeroplane flights west of Day-
ton, O. But the first flight had been made
long before the crowd reached the park,
Glenn Curtiss having stolen a march on
the centennial officials, newspaper men
and his fellow aviators by making two
short test flights shortly after daybreak.
Not a dozen persons saw these perform-
ances, which lasted only a few moments
each.

Curtiss drove a biplane of the same
type which he used at Rheims, except
that it carried an engine of twenty-five-
horse power as against one of fifty-horse
power in the foreign contest.

The dirigible balloons were also up sev-
eral times during the day, their pilots
giving the machines tryouts for the for-
mal tests of Friday and Saturday. The
pageantry feature of the day's centennial
program was an industrial parade. It
was one of the longest of the week and
illustrated by floats the progress of man-
ufacture and commerce during the one
hundred years since the incorporation of
St. Louis as a municipality.

TRAVELS GREATEST DISTANCE
AND GETS LAHM CUP.

HIGHT HONORS TO NEW YORK

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**TO TAKE THE
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ST. LOUIS, October 7.—Officials of the Aero Club of St. Louis were today figuring out the official result of the balloon race which started here Monday. The unofficial results give the honors to the St. Louis III, S. L. von Phul, pilot, and the New York, C. B. Harmon, pilot. The former won the first prize for distance besides lifting the Lahm cup from Captain Chandler, of the United States Army, and the latter took endurance prizes and established a new American high record of 34,200 feet. The St. Louis III landed at Wahkin, Minn.

The Centennial, with H. E. Honeywell and J. W. Tolland, alighted at Silas, Alabama, Washington county, just north of Mobile, after having been in the air forty-eight hours. The latest returns of the contest follow:

Pommern, Arnold and Taylor, Knobel, Ark., 160 miles, 28 hours 20 minutes.

Hoosier (noncontestant), Crume and Custer, Russellville, Mo., 169 miles, 21 hours 30 minutes.

Centennial, Honeywell and Tolland, Silas, Ala., 485 miles.

Albany, Minn., is a little town about twenty-five miles west of St. Cloud, Minn. The Indiana descended in a field about three miles south of Albany. McGill, the pilot, was taken violently ill early in the day. He was loath to give up the flight, but his aid, Shauer, insisted that they descend for medical aid. In falling the balloon dashed into a tree.

Both men were thrown out, but they were so near the ground that their injuries were not serious. Shauer's shoulder was dislocated and McGill was jolted and bruised. The Indiana carried eighty thousand cubic feet of gas and part of the time sailed at an elevation of fifteen thousand feet.

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Mix Still Held In Russia.

WARSAW, October 7.—Edgar W. Mix,
the American aeronaut, and his balloon,
the America II, in which he won the in-
ternational race for the Gordon Bennett
cup, are still in the hands of the Russian

Petersburg authorities, and Mix has Rus-

started to meet any contingency.
