GOLDEN ENDURANCE RUN

Your Begins Wednesday—Some Good Races Will Back Track at Sheepshead Bay

New York, July 8.—Following a period of much activity in all branches of athletics, the present week promises little in the way of sports. The endurance run for the Golden automobile trophy, the competition of the American Amateur Golf championship, preliminary play for the Davis tennis trophy in England and the number of rich states in horse racing covers the list of events of national interest in sports during the next few days.

The qualifying rounds of the thirteen annual golf championships of the United States will begin on Tuesday over the links of the old club at Cleveland, and play will continue throughout the week. More than 100 amateurs will take part in the tournament, the first being the most representative one in the history of the game in America. There will be starting golf before the finals are reached, and very likely a new champion of 1937. The qualifying and final rounds of play are at this city's hotel.

The fourth annual American Automobile Association tour for the Golden trophy will start from Cleveland on Wednesday and finish in New York city July 22. More than seventy members will engage in the great endurance run, the route of which takes them west to Chicago and back east through Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

The Golden trophy will be awarded to the club or clubs scoring the greatest number of points, each club being given points for each hole. The route covers 1,618 miles and the daily runs will average 120 miles, the longest being 177 on the longest day. Each car must be driven by the entrant, and must carry not less than two passengers of an average weight of 125 pounds, or its equivalent in ballast, and have leaving car body with compass.

WAR IS INEVITABLE. Germany's Statesman Can See No Other Outcome. Berlin, July 8.—The conviction of an ultimate conflict between Japan and the United States appears to be widespread in Germany.

It is one of the subjects certain to be referred to by German diplomats and military and naval officials and others occasioned by recent international political news. The newspapers agree that President Roosevelt is earnestly trying to satisfy the Japanese request. They agree also that Japan sees nothing unreasonable.

They recognize that the difficulty lies in the question of race, the economic antagonism of the Orient against the United States and the constitutional impossibility of Federal coercion.

It is believed by many that the group of ruling statesmen in Japan are preparing to fight the United States for the mastery of the Pacific, regardless of the San Francisco incident.

The strategic element of the military program is a naval war between Japan and the United States. The most interesting program of the day.

Barney Oldfield Attempts Suicide.
Portland, Ore., July 8--Brooding over his arrest on a charge of fraud for alleged fake racing in the automobile meet on Thursday, Barney Oldfield, the automobile speed marvel, attempted to commit suicide. Oldfield tried to leap from a window of the Portland hotel. He was restrained only by the united efforts of his wife and a detective. The excited man smashed out a window with his bare hands, which were badly cut. Mrs. Oldfield grasped her husband's clothing and held on until help came. Oldfield, the king of automobile drivers, is the holder of all track records from one to fifty miles. He was the first driver to negotiate one mile on a circular track in less than one minute, and in 1894 astonished the world by whirling around the circular mile course at Los Angeles at the rate of a mile in 55 seconds. In his attempts to establish a new world's record he has had three narrow escapes from death and has killed three spectators.
