Howard Must Serve Life Sentence.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—The supreme court has denied the appeal of James B. Howard from the sentence of life imprisonment imposed by the Kentucky courts for complicity in the murder of Governor William Goebel. Howard asserted that the action of the trial court in examining one of the jury without the prisoner being present was an infringement of his rights under the constitution. The supreme court denied this contention.

DECATUR AT THE BAR

Naval Court Martial Trying Middy For Hazing.

ACCUSED ON STAND IN OWN DEFENSE

Denies Under Oath Testimony Given by McCreary and Church Which Incriminates Him--Defense Closes Its Case.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Jan. 3.—The court martial proceedings against Midshipman Stephen Decatur, Jr., charged with the hazing of Midshipman Isaac N. McCreary of Texas and Gaylord Church of Pennsylvania, fourth class men, were continued, Decatur going on the stand in his own defense. Decatur denied absolutely all the statements of McCreary and Church which incriminated him. The court is thus left to decide between the testimony under oath of the upper and lower class men.

Young Decatur is a lineal descendant of Commodore Stephen Decatur, hero of the war with Tripoli, and has a large circle of distinguished friends and relatives, many of whom are attending the trial.

Whether or not the sound of standing on one's head, as it is practiced at the Naval Academy, can be recognized by a person in an adjoining room proved to be the disputed point in the evidence submitted by the defense. A number of midshipmen testified that they were in Decatur's room the day that McCreary had said Decatur had hazed him and that they had seen no fourth class men there.

Other witnesses introduced were Midshipmen George A. Trevor and Robert E. Thornton, both fourth class men, who testified that Church had said that the more he thought of it the more unwilling he was to swear that Decatur was the one who had hazed him. This is a violation of orders, as all the witnesses are warned not to talk about the case.

The defense in Decatur's case is now closed, and there will be several witnesses in rebuttal brought by the prosecution. It is probable that the case will be finished today and given to the court.

Will Personally Present War Medal.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—President Roosevelt will personally present to Captain Church, now in the medical corps of the army, the medal which is to be awarded to him for conduct at La Guasima, when, as assistant surgeon of the rough rider regiment, he distinguished himself in face of the fire of the enemy. The presentation will take place at the White House on Jan. 10, when there will be present in addition to President Roosevelt, Secretary Taft, Lieutenant General Chaffee and Surgeon General O'Reilly.

Dewey in "Doing Nicely."

NORFOLK, Va., Jan. 3.—The dry dock Dewey, which is on its way to the Philippines, passed south of Cape Henry last night. This is shown by a message sent by Chief Boatswain Isaac of the United States supply ship Glacier, which is accompanying the Dewey, and addressed to his wife in this city, as follows: "Happy New Year. Doing nicely. Two hundred and twenty-five miles southeast of Cape Henry."

Miss Busch's Engagement Off.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 3.—The engagement of Miss Wilhelmina Busch, daughter of Adolphus Busch, the millionaire brewer, and Lieutenant Edward Scherer has been broken off. The young woman, who, it is said, was forced to elope with the German army lieutenant under a threat of suicide by the latter, will start soon for California accompanied by her father.

Tragedy at Caledonia.

CALEDONIA, Minn., Jan. 3.—Matt Styer, a dental student, killed his sweetheart, Pearl Wheaton, and then himself after shooting and probably fatally wounding her sister and mother at their home here. The tragedy has thrown the pall of at least one and possibly three deaths over the home of one of the most prominent families in this part of the state.

President Garry Herrmann of the Cincinnati Reds denied that he will give First Baseman Charley Carr to Brooklyn. Herrmann says he does not owe anything to the Brooklyn club.

Billy Lush again will do the field coaching of the Yale team for the coming season. The players will not be called out until Feb. 22 and hope to be on the field two weeks later.

Nig Cuppy, who held the record in the National league as the slowest and most deliberate pitcher, threatened to follow the example of Amos Rustie and get back in the game. Cuppy thinks his long rest has restored his pitching arm.

Harry Davis will succeed Lave Cross as captain of the Philadelphia Athletics. Cross's successor on third base will be chosen from seven new recruits.

Henry J. Bowdoin Arrested.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 3.—The grand jury which has been investigating the affairs of the Maryland Trust company under the old regime returned presentments against three of the former officials, and one of them, Henry J. Bowdoin, who was the vice president and in active charge at the time of suspension, has been arrested.

Revolt in Ecuador.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—A revolution has broken out in Ecuador, according to a dispatch received at the state department, which said that the troops and the police have joined the revolutionists under Colonel Teran. Telegraphic communication between Guayaquil and Quito has been interrupted.

Great Shoe Man Would Be President.

BOSTON, Jan. 3.—A well authenticated story comes from political friends of Governor Douglas at the statehouse that he is desirous of becoming the Democratic nominee for president in 1908 and for this reason will not retire from politics at the end of his term as governor, as at first announced.
