Famous Motor Racer Misses One, but Steps Before Another Car.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 20.—Barney Oldfield of Indianapolis today was run over by an auto. The biography of the man who has whizzed around race tracks and in road races at the rate of a mile in thirty seconds will have to record that while he was crossing Michigan avenue in Chicago shortly before noon on Tuesday, July 20, he was unable to get out of the way of a humble runabout.

Right behind Oldfield was Louis Strang also a "Speedeater."

Both were on foot and they were crossing the street to reach a cigar store. Strang shouted and Oldfield jumped. He escaped the machine he saw bearing down on him from the south, but landed squarely in front of a car hustling along from the north.

St. Lukes Hospital was only a block away and the battered racer, with face scratched and limbs and body sore, was carried into the surgical ward. There a careful examination revealed all the bones whole and properly articulated.
