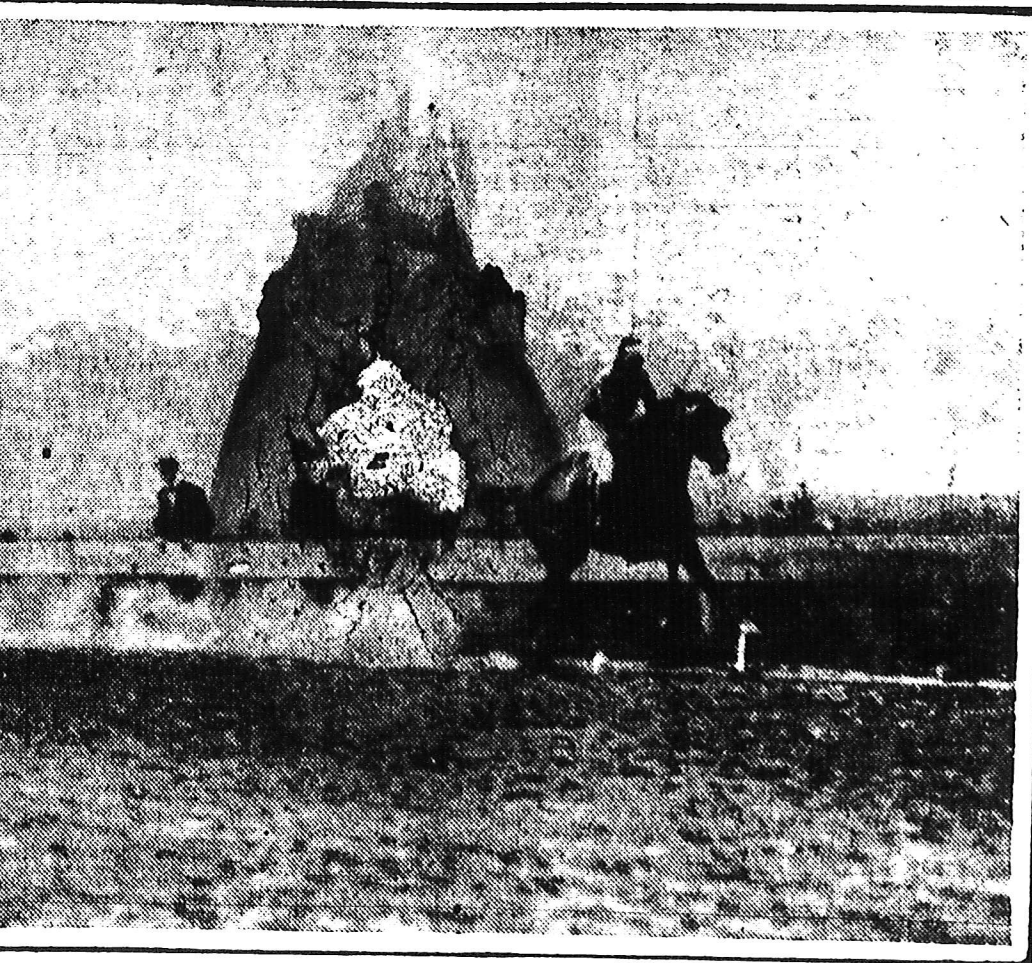

HONORS TO TOWNLEY

IS BEST AT COUNTRY CLUB

Blues Beat Reds at the Highland
Club—Schafer and Gar-
ber Win.

Under ideal weather conditions yesterday the local golfers spent the entire day on the links. At the Country Club two cups were up. The Jillson cup is a scratch event for thirty-six holes, with one exception, the most prominent event of the year at the course.

At the Riverside Park green the semi-finals in the Park Links championship tournament were held and at the Highland Club there was an exciting match between the Blues and the Reds, two teams in which were enrolled nearly all of the Highland players.

Morris M. Townley, president of the Indiana State Golf Association and captain of the Country Club team, captured all the honors in the holiday and William H. Jillson cup events yesterday at the Country Club. Mr. Townley played in excellent form and in the morning in the holiday cup handicap medal play event was first with a score of 81 for the eighteen holes. Mr. Townley started at scratch and had an easy time with his opponents, many of whom had large handicaps.

Honors to Townley.

In the Jillson cup play Townley again won the first honors, playing his second eighteen holes in 85, which gave him a total of 186 for the thirty-six holes. The first two rounds of the nine-hole course, which were for the holiday cup, also counted for the Jillson cup. W. H. Coburn came in for second honors in both the events.

Mr. Coburn made the last eighteen holes of the Jillson cup event in the same number of strokes as Mr. Townley, 85, but turned in a score of 88 for the first eighteen. This, however, was good for second for the holiday cup contest. Mr. F. S. Sattley was third in the Jillson cup play with 178. Several tied for third place in the holiday handicap play.

The golfers were in excellent form and furnished the best exhibition of the game that has been seen this year at the Country Club course. The followers of the game at the Country Club will have a large team in the State golf championship tourney which will be held upon the club links next week. From the starting made
