BARNEY OLDFIELD FIGHTS MILLIONAIRES IN SALOON

Automobile Racing "Dare-Devil" Uses
Fists on Two Wealthy Pool
Partners.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 2.—With a
billiard cue for a weapon Barney Oldfield,
the dare-devil of the automobile race track,
tonight attempted to "clean out" Tom
Mack's saloon. When the smoke of battle
cleared away Ben A. Fay, a well-known au-
tomobile race promoter, was bleeding pro-
fusely from a deep scalp wound inflicted by
Oldfield's cue. Oliver W. Posey, son of Ol-
iver P. Posey, a multi-millionaire mining and
lumberman, stopped a blow from Oldfield's
fist and his right eye went into mourning.

Oldfield went into Mack's place with Posey,
Melville Nordlinger, a jeweler; Rodney Mc-
Ray, and a prize fight promoter. The quar-
tet engaged in a game of pool. Oldfield and
McRay are said to have lost a couple of
games.

Becoming angered Oldfield shot his fist
into Posey's face and then sought to follow
up his advantage with a billiard cue.
