

Caleb Bragg yesterday won a two-mile race from Barney Oldfield, the speed king, and today these men will compete again for the next two heats of what may prove to be the greatest Motordrome sensation of a year. Oldfield lost to the millionaire amateur because he started his car at such terrific speed that the very tires could not clutch the track. Both men drove wonderfully well and from tape to finish there was not the defference of twenty feet between them. Barney's magnificent Blitzen-Benz picked up yard by yard, but the distance of two miles was not far enough to warrant a win.

"Bragg is a great driver," was the sole comment of Oldfield, after he had covered the run. "I admire the boy for his race, his headmanship and his spunk. He was, of coarse, substituted for older, more experienced and abler drivers who should have been forced to meet me. He was game enough to come out and run and the fact that he won makes him more admirable, in my personal estimation.

Coffroth came into the city quietly to have a look at Oldfield's wonderful Blitzen Benz with which the champion fractured all world's records for speed over the Florida beach two weeks ago, and rode to the track with Barney in the latter's six cylinder Knox car.


Jimmy borrowed a pair of goggles from George Robertson, buttoned up the pocket containing his wallet and told Barney to cut loose. Barney is awfully sensitive about such instructions and soon slipped into "high." Coffroth was holding on as tenaciously as a wearied fighter in the forty-fourth round.
