

MARRIOT NEAR DEATH OBJECT TO MAUTNERI  
WORMWOOD CONTESTS PRESENCE BLOCKS A DEAL

Woman Crosses Path of Stanley  
Machine Going Over Two

TIME MADE IS ALL SLOW

OHMONT, Va., Jan. 22.—Fred Marriot came dangerously near losing his life this morning while fighting for the Grand National trophy in the motor race. He had driven the Stanley auto at better than 30 miles an hour when a woman suddenly appeared in his path. Marriot leaped to the side of the road, driving into the water up over the hubs of his car and all but put out the fire. Marriot says it was the worst fall of his life.

Narrow tracks were entered on this, the opening day of the four-day contest. The conditions of the course were such that it was necessary to get the Stanley motor into the water. The event had only two starts, Marriot, with the Stanley, and Capt. C. B. Hutton, with the Buick.

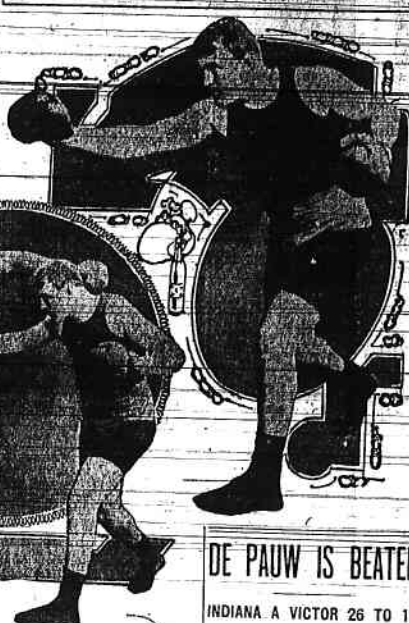

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ORMOND, Fla., Jan. 22.—Fred Marriot came dangerously near losing his life this morning while battling for signal honors in the mile race. He had gotten the Stanley going at better than 30 seconds to the mile, when suddenly a woman stepped in his path. Marriot instantly turned his car out of the course, driving into the water up over the hubs of his car and all but put out the fire. Marriot says it was the closest call of his life.

Narrow records were gathered on this, the opening day of the motor tournament proper. The conditions of the course were excellent but there was an entire absence of that wind so necessary to get the local marks any further. Moreover, the events scheduled today were all, save one for the stock cars and that one, although known as the five-mile world's championship so far as speed was concerned, is far below that of a year ago.

This event had only two starters, Marriot, with the Stanley, and Capt. C. E. Hutton, with Rolls-Royce.

Of course the steamer fairly ran away with the foreign machine. To tell the truth it was hardly what might be termed an even match, as one car was a touring car pure and simple and the other an out-and-out racing machine. The result was what might have been anticipated, a hollow victory for Marriot, whose time was 3 minutes 44 4-5 seconds.

#### Rogers in a Mishap.

In the five miles stock car race, Rogers of Boston met with a slight mishap and was placed out of the running at the three-mile mark, the event going to Blakely of Boston with the American Mercedes. Hutton, in the Rolls-Royce, was second.

In the one-mile American touring car championship there was found one English driver and an English machine. Had this not been so Marriot in his Stanley would have had a clean walkover. As it was he won handily, the Rolls-Royce finishing some distance in the rear. In this event Marriot lost time by being forced into the water.

The most interesting events were purely stock races, in which cars were in the same conditions as they would be for touring.

The mile event was really a race. Each car was compelled to carry its full complement of passengers. At the start, Asa Payne, in his Winton, captured the lead, maintaining the same until 100 feet from the finish, when Ralph Owen, in the Oldsmobile, in which he toured from New York to Ormond, won by running in 1:27 4-5. Payne got second. J. H. McCarthy in his Wayne was third to cross the finish line and then followed Walter Baker in the Peerless.

The other event was a quarter mile race with the high speed cars. This met

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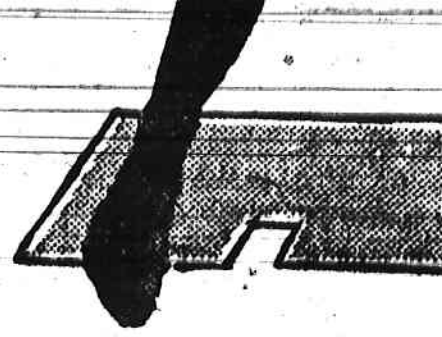
