## DIRECTORS CHANGE NAME TO WILLYS-OVERLAND CO.

Capital Stock of the Automobile Corporation Has Been Increased from \$800,000 to \$1,500,000.

At a meeting of the directors of the Overland Automobile Company yesterday afternoon the name of the company was changed to the Willys-Overland Company and the capital stock was increased to \$1,500,000. The former capitalization was \$800,000.

The increased capitalization was made because of the recent purchase of the former plant of the Pope-Toledo Automobile Company at Toledo, O., and because of the extensive improvements that have just been completed both at the Toledo and Indianapolis plants.

Following the meeting it was also announced that the company expected to manufacture twenty thousand automobiles during the season of 1910, of which about nine thousand would be manufactured in this city and the remainder in Toledo.

Although the Overland was first manufactured in 1903, it was taken over by the present management in 1908, and since that time the company has grown rapidly. At the beginning of the 1908 season the plant consisted of a building of about fifty thousand square feet of floor space in West Indianapolis. Since that time the plant of the Maron Motor Car Company, at Fifteenth street and the Big Four railroad has been taken over and 36,000 square feet of space has been leased in the Laycock industrial building.

The company has just finished two buildings, 80x368 feet, each two stories high, and one three-story building, 60x80 feet, adjoining the West Indianapolis plant.

When the Toledo plant was purchased last year it contained 412,000 square feet of space, but a new building containing 165,000 square feet of floor space has just been added.
