VERTREES ROASTS THE PRESS.

Attorney for Ballinger Lets Loose His Wrath Before the Committee.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—In opening his argument before the congressional committee yesterday afternoon, Mr. Vertrees, counsel for Secretary Ballinger, made a scathing denunciation of the press for its attitude toward the Ballinger-Pinchot case and said the only commandment the newspaper men seemed to obey was, "Die as this day our daily bread."

Looking down and smiling on the committee, Mr. Vertrees began his reply, seated on the other side of the case. "I can not but admire the subtlety of your faith," he said, referring to the statement just made by Mr. Pepper, attorney for Clifford Pinchot. Then, referring to the remarks of both Mr. Brandeis and Mr. Pepper, he continued:

"One of those gentlemen told me what they called a wishy-washy man named Ballinger. Was that was the agent of Mr. Brandeis? No, the agent of Mr. Pepper. Now, the absolute man, absolutely dominating, controlling every man around him, on see the difficulty I am in.
