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

WASP IS EASILY REPAIRED

HILL CLIMB POSTPONED.

WILKES-BARRE, June 11.—The automobile hill climb up Giants despair for today has been postponed on account of rain and wet track. Sixty cars were entered. The races will be run next Monday.

After participation in the climb up the tortuous Giants despair at Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Monday, the flying squadron of Marmon cars, under the direction of the indomitable Ray Harroun, will ship to Memphis, Tenn., where they will compete in a short meeting. From the southern city Harroun and his yellow fleet will start on a barnstorming expedition and remain in the field of contest until the Indianapolis speedway meeting, July 1, 2 and 4, brings the yellow-jacketed crew homeward-bound.

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
