Auto Stars to Race for Novel Cash Prize

With the world's greatest motor racing pilots dashing in mad flight for the cash reward over the sand-papered course of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, next Saturday afternoon the contest for the Remy Grand Brassard promises to be one of the most sensational and interesting events on the program which will open the most magnificent track that ever felt the outer casing of pneumatic tire. A twenty-five-mile open event with a handsome cash reward of \$75 per week as long as the victorious pilot successfully defends possession of the trophy would be expected to draw the talent and the entries have exceeded the fondest expectations of the donor.

The Remy Grand Brassard is probably the most original and unique trophy that has been hung for racing drivers in the history of motor speed carnivals. The brassard is a curiously wrought arm shield made of silver and bears with it a cash bonus of \$75 per week until the second meet on the Speedway in September, when the driver holding the brassard must enter the second race for the trophy and successfully defend its possession.

The race for the trophy will be one of the leading events on the program of the three meets scheduled at the Speedway during the months of August, September and October, and with such a field of fearless pilots competing in the world's highest powered gasoline cars it should become a classic and give the donor of the trophy, Mr. Frank Remy, the young millionaire magneto manufacturer of Anderson, Ind., a name which will live long in the annals of motor racing.

Having achieved fame and fortune in the making of Remy magnetos, Mr. Remy was naturally interested in the success of the stupendous enterprise of the Speedway, which has given all Hoosierdom, and Indianapolis particularly, such a prominent place in the motor car industry.
