

In what is described by Justice Henry Lamm of the supreme court of Missouri as a "ce ebrated case" the court nanded down a decision exonerating the Missouri mule. Some years ago one Lyman sued one Dale for damages done to the plaintiff's buggy by "the aforesaid wild and unruly mule." After being considered by justices of the peace, one circuit judge, three judges of the court of appeals and four supreme court fustices the mule is exonerated by Judge Lamm as follows:
