[Special to The Indianapolis Star.] GREENCASTLE, Ind., March 6.—As the result of the sudden and early interest in baseball, caused by the announcement of the 1915 schedule, already some twenty men have reported for practice at DePauw University.

Grim Expected Soon. Coach Jack Grim is expected to arrive and take charge of the candidates within the next ten days, or as soon as weather conditions will permit of regular outdoor work.

The men to be considered for first class honors are Dunn, Ford, Eberly and Gibbs. While any of these men could be depended upon in a majority of the contests, each one has some weaknesses that probably would make it unwise to send him against the stronger lines.

New Schedule Pleases. Rarely has an athletic schedule attracted as much attention here as the one just announced by Manager Ellis. WASHINGTON, March 6.—New Mexico Military Institute is the winner of the rifle shooting championship of the military schools of the country, having won all of the seven matches and concluded the series with a percentage of 96.7 for the grand aggregate of hits.

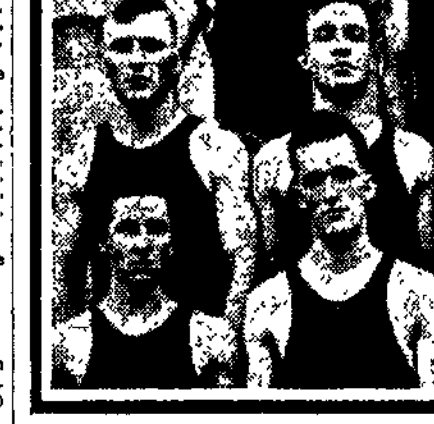

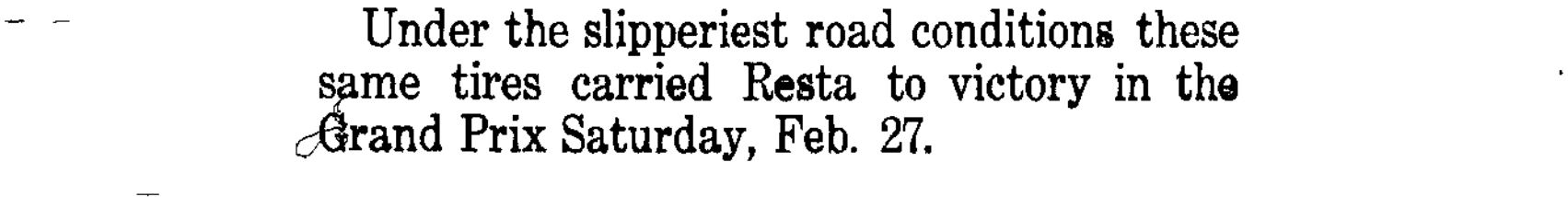
