**DETROIT, Mich.**—The Lincoln Highway is now prepared to handle demands for large wall maps showing the route of the transcontinental road from New York to San Francisco, together with the main feeder and connecting roads throughout the country. The new maps are complete and perfect in every detail. Every town, city and county in the United States is marked and named. The maps will meet popular demand.

**DELPHOS, Ohio.**—A new bridge over the Miami and Erie Canal on the Lincoln Highway in Delphos is to be erected. This is one of a number of improvements contemplated in the neighborhood of Delphos on the route, the roads having been worked in excellent shape in both directions from the town.



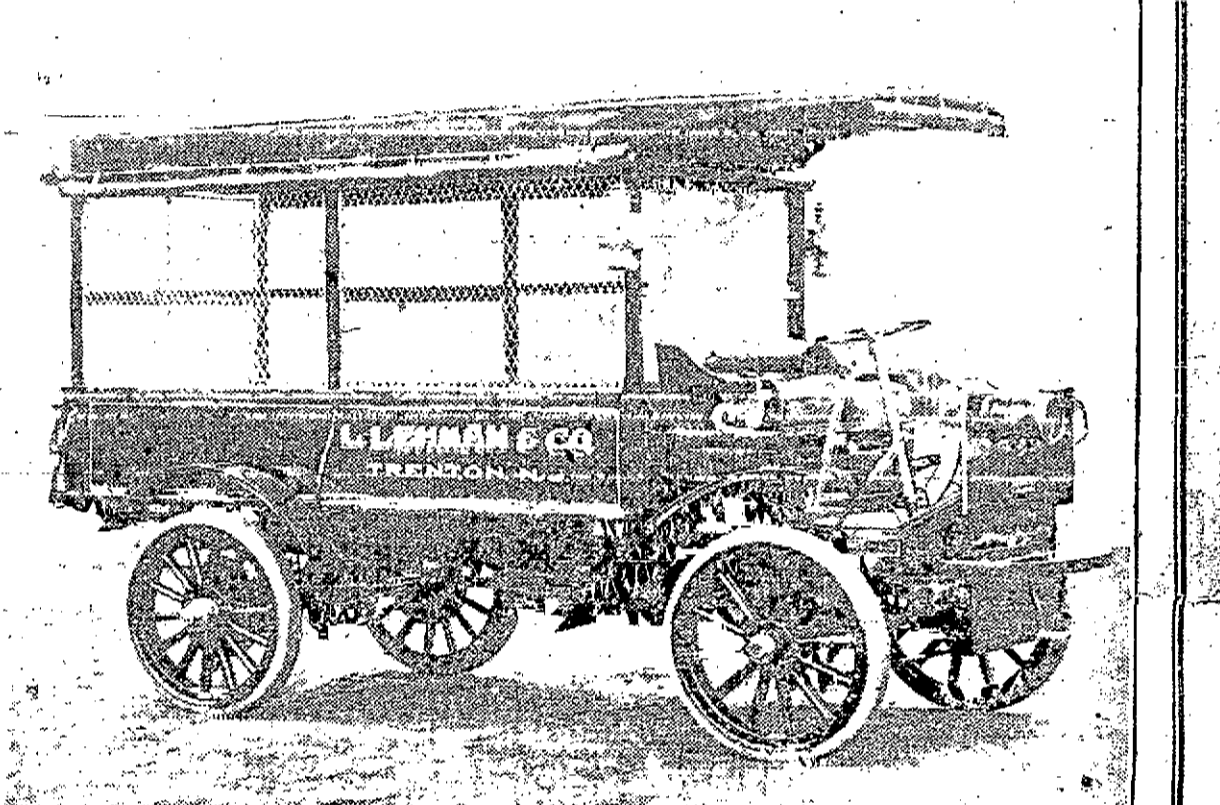

We Again Demonstrated in Last Saturday's 300 Mile Test Trip

The car was driven the 300 miles at an average speed of 25 miles an hour; it averaged 22 miles to a gallon of gasoline, and the engine stopped but once throughout the whole trip, and then only because gasoline ran out between supply stations.

A stock car was used and the trip was taken over roads in Mercer, Monmouth and Ocean Counties. Roads were picked indiscriminately, and more than 50 miles of very poor roadway were traversed. The engine did not miss once during the entire journey. No tire trouble was experienced and the car held straight to the road under high speed. The gasoline was measured out of standard five gallon cans.
