

# RACE STARS FEARLESS TO THE LAST

These hardy sons of steel are but the products of the past.

Hermes, and of speed classed two of the best in the world. It is a pity that the death of these men should be the end of their careers.

Resta did not finish the race and was not considered much of a driver until a few months later when he went over to England and started driving a Sunbeam. In England the great Resta was again himself and he became a star again after a few victories.

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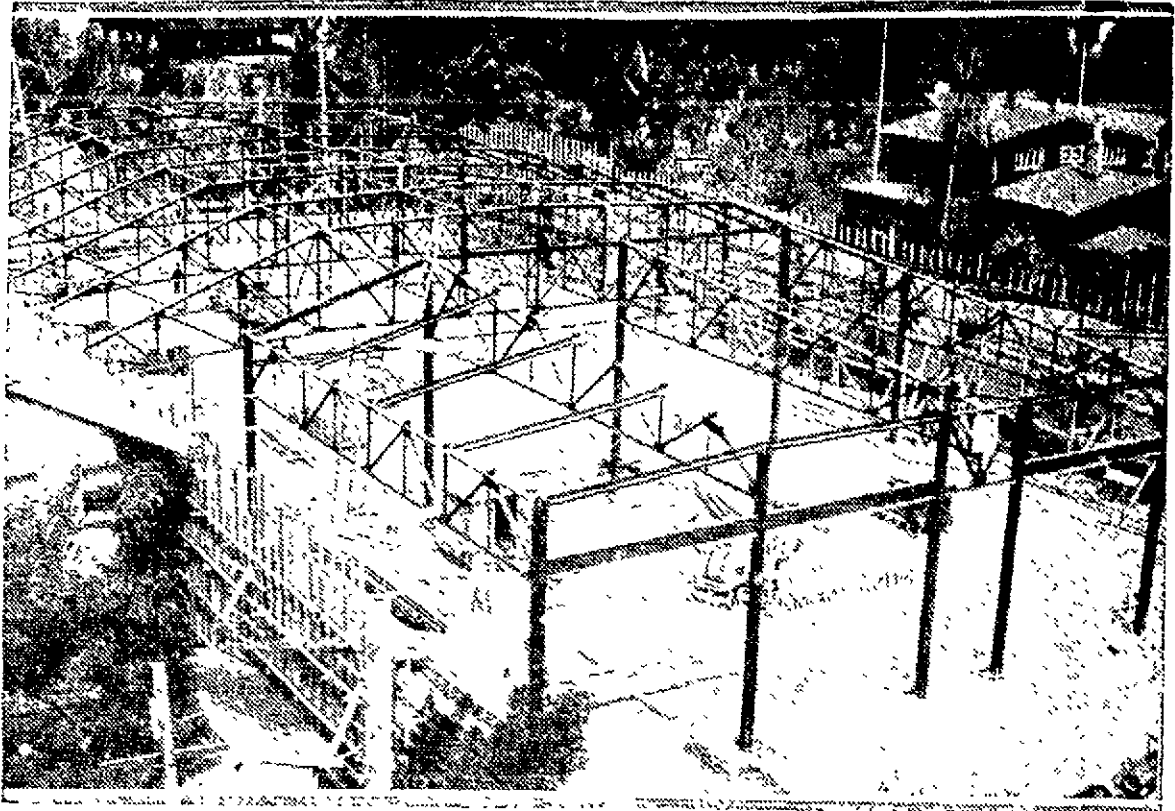
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New Building on Upper Broadway

Only real representative American racing cars of that day were the Meiser and Stutz which were semi-stock models and deadly rivals. It was the Stutz Meiser and Duesenberg that the Peugeot defeated and Resta was the king of kings on the speedway until Miller and Duesenberg began building cars that made the two American creations look like freight engines.

After the war, Resta retired from racing and went into business in New York. He was the American representative to the Sunbeam. He also had interests in other lines in New York.

For the July 4 race of 1918 at Tacoma, Wash., Resta was induced to enter and drive a Peugeot. He entered but as a driver he was all through. He stepped on the backsteer and announced that he had broken a crankshaft. Later he drove the car into town. It was a great mistake, but Resta forgot.

After that Resta stayed out of racing and was quite a successful business man for a time. Then, late in 1920, the crash came to a lot of the boys with paper profits and Resta was sent to the cleaners. Within a year the former speed idol was ready to make some more money out of racing and he came to California to drive as a member of Cliff Durant's team in the Beverly Hills classic.

STARS AGAIN.  
On the team with Resta were Memphis, Art Klein, Eddie Heenan, Earl Cooper and Durant. Resta was a great failure in his "comeback." It was a great difference to be a car that would turn up 125 miles an hour after a long vacation when his fastest car in the olden days was good for but 100 or 103 when pushed to the limit.

Resta said he had trouble with his pressure and a leak in his gas tank bothered him. The leak was never found and the gas pressure was also O. K., but Resta said he could drive the Indianapolis course and was signed as a member of the Packard team for the 1923 Indianapolis 500-mile race.

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# AUTOMOBILE CLUB MAKES SUMMARY OF LAW ON SPEED

The average motorist should be better acquainted with the state speed laws than he appears to be from the frequency of his introduction to the city traffic bureaus and to the police courts. Do you know that you can travel thirty-five miles an hour within the limits of a city under certain conditions?

The following outline of the state law has been prepared by the Safety Bureau of the National Automobile Club for the information of motorists:

- 1. The speed of the car must at all times be such as not to endanger the life or property of any person. The driver must have due regard for the amount of traffic and the surface or width of the highway.
- 2. Fifteen miles an hour is the limit in the following cases: (a) Crossings where view is obstructed; (b) Intersections where view is obstructed; (c) On curves where view is obstructed; (d) Passing schools when persons are entering or leaving grounds; (e) In a business district, that is, where the buildings on the highway are mainly used for business purposes; (f) Grounds of a state, county or city institution.
- 3. Twenty miles an hour is the limit allowed in a district which is classed as "residential" where for not less than a quarter of a mile the dwellings and business structures are less than a hundred feet apart. There are many portions of towns and cities where a motorist may proceed at thirty-five mile limit under the state provisions.
- 4. Thirty-five miles an hour is the

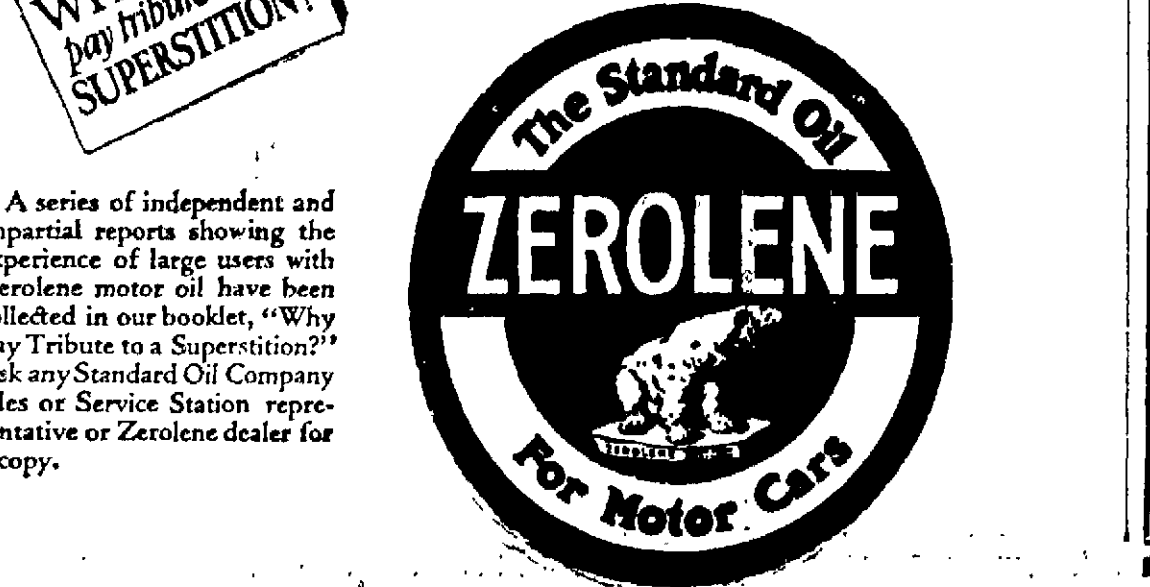
