

YOUTH WHO TOOK UP GOLF FOR HEALTH NOW RANKED WITH VETERAN TRAVERS

Golf has done for Phil Carter just what boxing did for Charlie White. It made a man of him. Carter, a frail 29-year-old youth, took up the ancient Scottish game in search of lost health. His advancement on the links has been so rapid that his name is now linked with Travers, Travis and Topping. He has come faster than any other star or near-star the last two seasons.

As a small boy he was pale and weak. His father, Dr. Carter, had young Phil accompany him around the links at Southampton as the best means of keeping his son outdoors. The spectacle of the little white ball being driven over long stretches of country land, over brooks and ponds and up and down hills fascinated the boy like thousands of others.

To his father's delight he began fooling with golf clubs. From the first he showed a natural aptitude for the game, the same way that most boys will take up baseball.

Phil quickly mastered the intricacies of the game to the point where he could drive a ball farther than most players who possessed greater strength. Then the boy went to school just outside Boston and for a tutor he had John Anderson, who was runner-up for the national amateur title at Detroit last summer.

When only 14 years of age Carter attracted attention by defeating John M. Ward, one of the stars of the Garden City club, in a tournament at the National links. After teaching 17 Phil captured the interscholastic championship three times. Then he tackled bigger game and won the annual north and south championship at Pinehurst.

Last season he won five club tournaments, a record no other player approached. This season Carter has been rather inactive on the links because of poor health. After winning the north and south title he took a long vacation from the game.

Aside from his natural ability with the clubs Carter possesses that rare temperament—nerve and sticktoitiveness that makes the successful match player. As a match player he is probably the equal of Jerry Travers.

RESTA WINNER IN THREE PART RACE

Auto Racing Records Fall in Chicago Speedway Performance.

Chicago, June 18.—Viva, Dario Resta! Riding as Sheridan rode through the valley of the Shenandoah, Dario Resta and his invincible blue Peugeot yesterday defeated Ralph de Palma and the Mercedes in all three of the match races held on the Chicago speedway. In his triumphant drives Resta established new American records for ten, twenty-four and fifty miles, and clinched beyond a shadow of a doubt his claim to the title of American speedway champion.

Resta captured the fifty mile event in 31:57.4, his average of 94 miles per hour bettering the 88.87 mile per hour mark of Josef Christians, made on the Indianapolis speedway in the 1914 international sweepstakes. His margin of victory over De Palma in this race was 10 3-5 seconds.

Speeds at 105 Mile Clip. In winning the twenty-four mile race, the fastest contest of the afternoon, Resta averaged 105 miles an hour, his time being 13:42.6. De Palma's Mercedes crossed the wire three and one-fifth seconds astern the Peugeot.

Both drivers averaged 101 miles per hour in the ten mile event. Resta taking first honors by only two-fifths of a second. The best previous record for this distance was 89.28 miles per hour, established by George Robertson with a Simplex at Los Angeles in 1910. Fully 40,000 spectators witnessed the battle royal of the two Italians.

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
