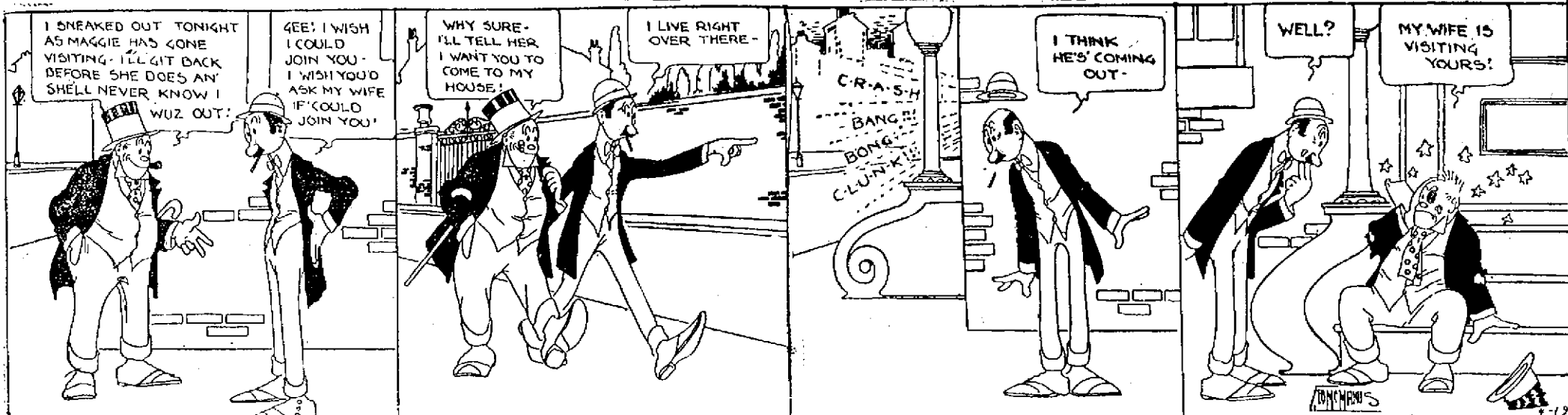

Dario Resta, Twice Champion Plans To Enter New Car—Duray To Compete.



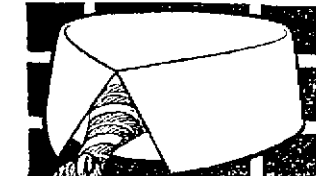

Pacific Coast League Opens Season Today

SEATTLE, Wash., April 30.—The 1918 season of the Pacific Coast International league was opened officially here this afternoon with Seattle playing Aberdeen, Wash. After an automobile parade of the two teams through the downtown section of the city, Mayor Ole Hanson headed the first ball and the game was on.

The league this year consists of six clubs, Seattle, Tacoma, Spokane, Portland, Vancouver, B. C., and Aberdeen. Butte and Great Falls, Montana, which were in the old Northwestern league, which the new Pacific Coast league succeeds, have been dropped and in their places are Portland and Aberdeen. Last year Portland played in the old Pacific Coast league.

Each week two or three exhibition games will be played against the team representing Uncle Sam's army at Camp Lewis, American Lake.
