AUTOS RACE TODAY

LIGHT CAR EVENT SLATED

"BABY" CONTESTANTS RECEIVE FINAL
INSTRUCTIONS—MACHINES ARE
READY TO START IN 200-
MILE STRUGGLE.

SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 24.—All of the
foreign and American drivers who are
to pilot cars in the international light
car and grand prize races here were
called together tonight at the headquar-
ters of the Automobile Club of America
in the Hotel De Soto and given their
final instructions for the races. The light
car event—a twenty-lap jaunt around a
short ten-mile triangle—will be started
tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock and the
indications point tonight to fifteen en-
trants.

The grand prize race of 402.08 miles,
the longest road race ever run in Amer-
ica, will be started at 9 o'clock Thank-
sgiving morning with twenty of the fast-
est cars representing France, Germany,
Italy and the United States entered.
The conditions of the races and the rules
of the course were read to the drivers
tonight through interpreters and the last
doubtful points were discussed and dis-
posed of.

Light Cars Ready.

Everything is in readiness for the light
car race tomorrow. The tiny racing ma-
chines will be sent away at half minute
intervals, and if all goes well the last
of the fifteen should hardly be under
way before No. 1 comes swirling
down the home stretch in completion of
the first lap. The unusually large number
of laps to the race and the short in-
tervals separating the cars are expected
to furnish plenty of excitement to the
thousands of people gathered in the
grandstands at the finish line.

curred to the light cars, and there is
not a little apprehension tonight lest
the more daring of the drivers should send
