## SAVANNAH DECIDES UPON ANOTHER BIG AUTO RACE

Negotiations Closed for Event Next Sumamer With Hopes of Equaling International 1903 Meet,

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—It was learned on the best of authority that negotiations which have been under way for some months with a view to the holding of another big road race in Savannah have been satisfactorily concluded. The contest is to take place some time next summer. As to the kind of cars eligible, or whether the affair is to be national or international, no details are available. It is probable, however, that the race will be for stock cars and that large cash prizes will be offered in the effort to attract the stars among the foreign drivers.

Since the Grand Prize race of a year ago, the most successful contest of the kind, financially and otherwise, ever held in America, the Savannah enthusiasts have been influential enough to keep the course used on that occasion in racing condition. The race circuit, in fact, has become one of the sights of the city, and nearly all visitors to Savannah travel over it, President Taft being among its notable admirers.




