

In an obscure corner of an Indianapolis
factory stands a machine which, if ex-
pert opinions are true, will again cause
the automobile eyes of the entire world
to rest on this city.

The first twelve-cylinder motor is now
ready to be placed in its body. After
two years and more of careful, consistent
study, George Schebler believes he has
accomplished his desire to prove he can
produce carburetion for that many cylinders.
He is a member of the Wheeler-
Schebler Carburetor Company.

An eight-cylinder Darraz, driven by
Demogeot in 1907 on Florida Beach, made
two miles in 58 2-5 seconds. It was
brought to America by Hemery. This has
been the criterion of motor advance, but
now faces defeat at the hands and brains
of Indiana motorists.

Will Assemble Car at Once.

Schebler will have his motor taken to
the Fisher Garage tomorrow, where im-
mediate work of assembling the entire
car will begin. The machine will be a
light low affair and promises to add an-
other victory to the progress of commer-
cialism and sportsmanship.

This motor does not occupy more space
than an ordinary six-cylinder one. It
is a double opposed engine. Schebler
says it is possible to have all the cylinders
shoot at once. The speed that can
be obtained is an entire speculation at
present, but if all plans work out as pres-
ent indications seem to point they will,
all previous records will be left behind
by this new creation. It will supply more
than 100-horse power.
