HARVARD TRIUMPHS OVER YALE STARS ON HOUSATONIC Varsity Crew Starting Out in Second Place Speeds Up and Passes the Blue

DERBY, Conn., June 1.—Harvard's varsity defeated Yale in the annual boat race on the Housatonic river this afternoon by two lengths. Harvard's time was 10:58. The distance was two miles.

Yale's eight was ahead at every stage of the race until the mile and a quarter mark was passed, when the Harvard stroke speeded up the time and the shell bearing the Crimson steadily poked its nose out in front and never was headed.

The course held 15,000 spectators. In spite of the fact that it is located in the most heated spot ever selected. No observation trails were run and the highway running along the river bank is so narrow as to forbid the passing of carriages.

The course was used for the first time, although it had been selected two years ago. It was found to be ideal, with the exception of a slight curve which made one course six inches longer than the other. Yale took the outside course.

VESUVIUS REPORTED IN FULL ERUPTION BY ROME DISPATCH

ROME, June 1.—Mount Vesuvius is in violent eruption, according to advices received here late today.

Vesuvius, the only really active volcano in Europe, is located on the east side of the Bay of Naples, about ten miles from the city.

It is 4,360 feet high. Its eruption, in 79 A. D., overwhelmed the city of Pompeii and the city of Herculaneum, resulting in the death of thousands.

The last eruption was in 1906. The loss of life was comparatively small, including the citizens of Naples, more than a million people live within a possible destructive radius of the mountain.
