Vesuvius, the only really active volcano in Europe, is located on the east side of the Bay of Naples, about ten miles from the elty.

It is 4,380 feet high. Its cruption, in 70 A. D., overwhelmed the city of Pompoii and the loty of Herculaneum, resulting in the death of thousands.
