ST. PAUL WANTS O'DOWD.

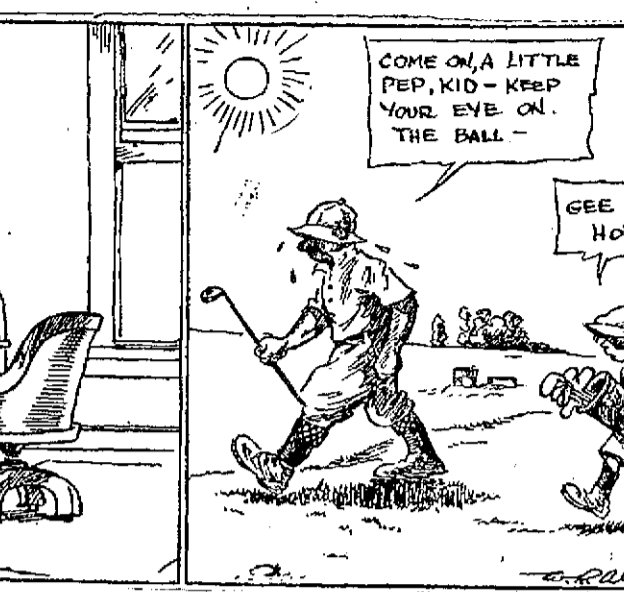
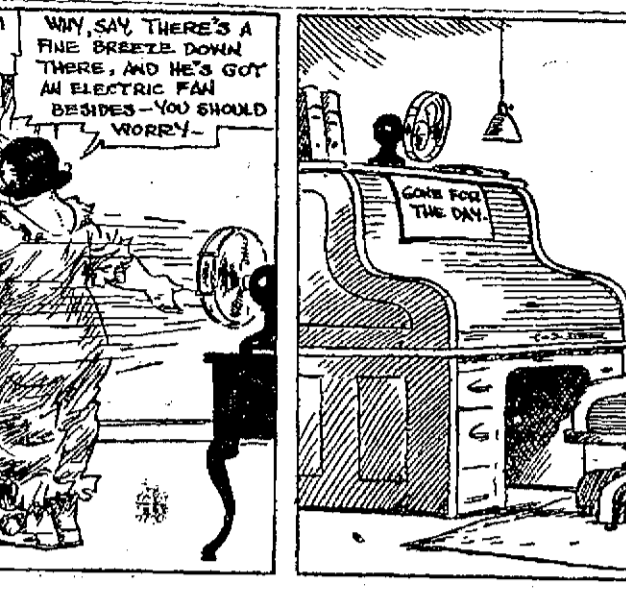

PIRATES ROUGH ON PITCHERS.

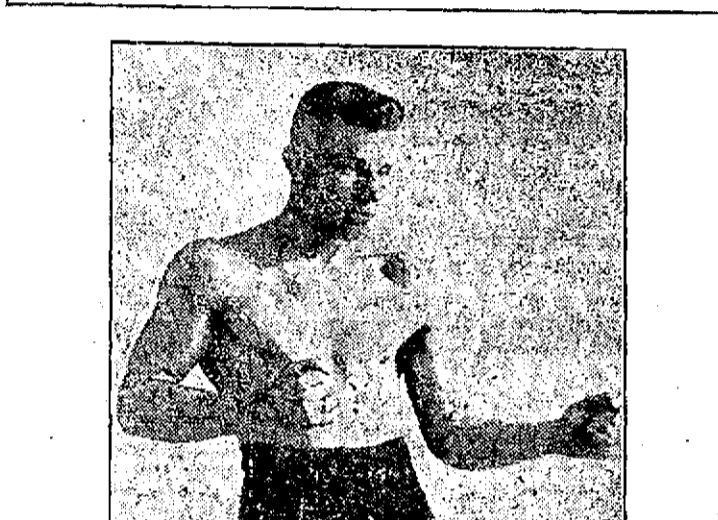
Collect Sixteen Hits From Three Philadelphia Hurriers and Win 8 to 1.

Leo Kelly, St. Louis, former champion of Camp Funston, and "Bum" Stuehmer, Davenport, former champion of southwestern army camps, will meet in a ten round boxing bout at the Waterloo theatre Monday evening.

Stuehmer has also been anxious to clash with Comiskey and his supporters in this vicinity have been anxious to have him meet the St. Paul sensation all winter. It was decided to match the two army stars and the winner will be given an opportunity to take away the glory Tommy Comiskey has earned by his wonderful showing during the past spring and winter.

Stuehmer is here. The Davenport soldier-athlete arrived in Waterloo last evening and announced he was ready for action. He was met by a number of his former gray pals, who will be present Monday evening to pull for a victory for the champion of the Sandstorm division.

Stuehmer has been training since his return from overseas with a number of Tri-City boxers and is apparently in condition for his battle on Monday evening.

Kelly has been training in Waterloo for the bout and stated last evening that he was in better shape than when he met Comiskey ten days ago. He has had the advantage of several fast boxing partners and they have aided materially in preparing him for the battle.

Kelly realizes that he will meet another worthy foe on Monday evening, but has confidence in his ability to carry thru.

Will Arrive Monday. Kid Fiske and Battling Johnson, who will meet in the semi-windup, will arrive in Waterloo Monday morning accompanied by their managers.

These two bouts and the opening event will complete one of the classic programs of the year, as the four participants in the two big events are the style of battlers the local fans enjoy seeing in action.

WILLARD WORKS IN BOILING SUN

Big Crowd Sees Champion in Action.—Challenger Still Idle.

[Associated Press Telegram] Toledo, Ohio, June 14.—With street thermometers registering 110 degrees, Jess Willard continued his workout today to six rounds of boxing and the usual limbering up exercises, he displayed his ring wear to more than 1,000 persons, traveling three rounds with Jack Hempel and three with Walter Monahan.

DE PALMA SETS WORLD'S RECORD

Wins Fifty Mile Event at Sheephead Bay.—Resta Was Eliminated.

New York, June 14.—Ralph De Palma, taking the lead in the thirtieth miles of a fifty mile auto race at the Sheephead Bay track today, broke all world's records for fifty miles, winning by a margin of a third of a lap, in 26 minutes, 23.2 seconds.

The previous record for the distance was 26 minutes 57.3 seconds, made by Louis Chevrolet over the same track Sept. 22, 1917.

DePalma alternated in second and third positions with Ralph Mulford leading for the first twelve miles, but on the next lap shot to the front and never was headed. He crossed the finish line two-thirds of a mile ahead of Dave Lewis and Joe Boyer, who finished second and third, only a few feet apart.

At 30 miles DePalma's time was 15 minutes 52.6-10 seconds, wiping out the new world's time of 16 minutes 20.3 seconds, made by Mulford in another race scarcely one year previous. His time for forty miles was 31:39.4-10 and his average speed for the fifty miles was 114.5 miles an hour.

The timers and scorers did no announcement what time DePalma made for intermediates distances, but it will be announced officially early next week.

Dario Resta had engine trouble at the start and quit the race on the first lap. Ira Vail retired for a similar cause in the fourth.
