MILLER STARS IN IOWA STATE MEET

West High School Athlete Wins First Place in 100 and 220-Yard Dashes in Past Time.

Des Moines, May 26.—North High school, Des Moines, took the state meet Saturday, with a total of 19 points.

"Doc" Miller of Waterloo, west, one of the speediest athletes in the Waterloo institution has even turned out, brought particular honor to himself and to his school by winning the 100-yard dash from Brewton, speedy racer from Mason City, in 10-2-5 and the 220-yard dash in 22-4-5 seconds.

With firsts in the 100-yard and 220-yard dashes, Waterloo received 10 points and tied with Cedar Rapids for fifth place.

The high school fight was one of the bitterest fought in years.

Crawford of Mason City was the individual star of the meet in the high school division.

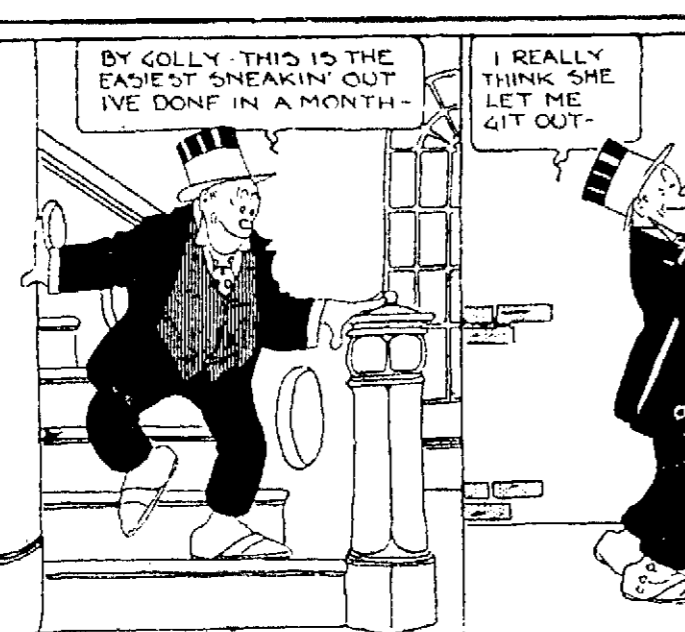

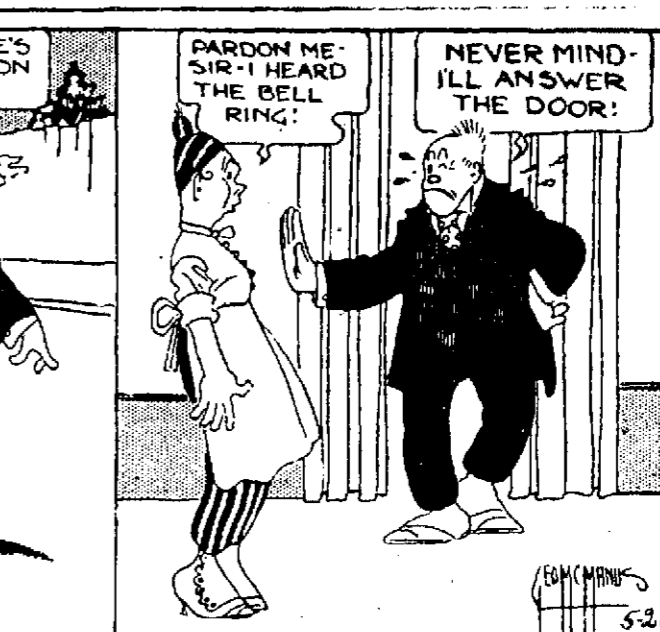

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GRINNELL WINS COLLEGE CLASSIC

Browning of Cornell, Sets New Mark in Mile; Two Other Records Tied.

COLLEGE RESULTS. Grinnell.....48 Ames.....32

Des Moines, May 26.—Grinnell track fans realized their fondest hopes here Saturday when the wearer of the Maltese Cross romped home with first honors in the twenty-eight annual state college track and field meet with an aggregate score of 48 points, 12 more than Ames, the nearest competitor, was able to muster.

Grinnell scored five firsts, Ames, Cornell, Simpson and Iowa each took two, Coe scored one and Des Moines college landed another.

One new record was established in the course of the afternoon and two more were tied. Browning of Cornell set a mark in the mile at 4:30 3-5. The Grinnell quartet of quarter milers traveled the mile in 3:36 1-5, tying the mark made by the Grinnell team in 1906.
