TAGGART ASKS HELP OF EYE SPECIALIST

Dr. Frank A. Morrison Leaves to Meet Returning Party at Louisville This Morning.

FRIENDS ARE NOT SANGUINE

Fear Loss of Eye Despite Cheerful Message Received From

Injured Man.

"MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 22.—To The Indianapolis Star: You are aware I was accidentally shot yesterday. No one was to blame. Am feeling well. Think there is a chance to save my eye. Will arrive Indian-

At the request of Thomas Taggart, who is on his way from Natchez, Miss., to his home in this city suffering from gunshot wounds in his face which may result in the loss of the sight of his right eye, Dr. Frank A. Morrison, an eye specialist, left Indianapolis at 3 o'clock yesterday after-

noon to attend the injured man when the party reaches Louisville. Mr. Taggart telegraphed his son, Thomas Jr., at French Lick Springs to find Dr. Morrison and the son wired W. A. Holt, manager of the Denison Hotel here, to have the physician go to Louisville to make an examination of the wounds.

Despite the fact that Mr. Taggart's personal telegrams sent to Indianapolis since the accident occurred have borne the information that his injuries were not serious, his friends here are not so sanguine and they fear that it will be important that it will be important.
