TAGGART ASKS HELP OF EYE SPECIALIST

Dr. Frank A. Morrison Leaves to
Meet Returning Party at Louis-
ville This Morning.

FRIENDS ARE NOT SANGUINE

Fear Loss of Eye Despite Cheer-
ful Message Received From
Injured Man.

"MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 22.—To The Indi-
anapolis Star: You are aware I was acci-
dentally shot yesterday. No one was to
blame. Am feeling well. Think there is a
chance to save my eye. Will arrive Indian-
apolis Sunday forenoon. T. TAGGART."

At the request of Thomas Taggart, who
is on his way from Natchez, Miss., to his
home in this city suffering from gunshot
wounds in his face which may result in
the loss of the sight of his right eye, Dr.
Frank A. Morrison, an eye specialist, left
Indianapolis at 8 o'clock yesterday after-
noon to attend the injured man when the
party reaches Louisville. Mr. Taggart
telegraphed his son, Thomas Jr., at
French Lick Springs to find Dr. Morrison
and the son wired W. A. Holt, manager of
the Denison Hotel here, to have the phy-
sician go to Louisville to make an ex-
amination of the wounds.

personal telegrams sent to Indianapolis
since the accident occurred have borne
the information that his injuries were not
serious, his friends here are not so san-
guine and they fear that it will be im-

Mr. Taggart's request to have Dr. Morris-
son in Louisville is taken by his friends
as an indication that he is not so
optimistic concerning the outcome of his
injuries as his telegrams have indicated.

Physician Leaves Quickly.

Dr. Morrison left on the 8 o'clock train
for Louisville yesterday afternoon, hav-
ing received the information from Mr.
Holt only a short time before time for the
train to leave. Whether the party will
proceed to Indianapolis after the exami-
nation of Mr. Taggart's injuries by Dr.
Morrison will depend upon the physi-
cian's advice.

Joseph E. Bell of this city, who was a
member of the hunting party when Mr.
Taggart was accidentally shot, sent a mes-
sage to Mr. Holt yesterday afternoon,
saying that he and the others in the
party believed the sight of the eye can
be saved. Mr. Bell said that Mr. Tag-
gart was shot in the right shoulder and
in the face. He said that they expected
to arrive in Indianapolis this morning.

At French Lick yesterday morning
Thomas Taggart Jr. talked to his father
over the long distance telephone from
Jackson, Miss., and the injured man said
that he was feeling well and that his
hurts "only stung a little." Mr. Bell's mes-
sage was sent from Harrison, Miss.

The latest Associated Press dispatches
state that Mr. Taggart will lose the sight
of his right eye. There are more than a
dozen small birdshot in his face, and
forty-two punctures of the flesh in the
shoulder were counted by the physicians
who attended the injured man immedi-
ately after the accident.

At Louisville This Morning.

Mr. Taggart's train is due to arrive
in Louisville at 7:55 o'clock this morn-
ing. Dr. R. C. French of Natchez is with
the injured man, and is looking after his
welfare en route.

W. H. Norton, who fired the shot which
caused the injury, said yesterday that he
was thankful he was using one of Mr.
Taggart's own guns at the time, as his
own piece was a different pattern, and a
shot from it would doubtless have proved
fatal.

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TALKS AT MEMPHIS.

Taggart Says He Appreciates Eye More When There's Danger of Losing It.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 22.—Smiling, but mightily battered, Thomas Taggart reached here tonight on his way to home and home comforts. His face is bandaged until it is hard to see where his grin begins and where it fades away behind the layer of gauze.

"The shot that winged me got a bird," he said. "One good thing about all this though," he continued, "my right eye will come out all right, so the doctor tells me, and that is an enormous relief. You can't imagine how important a right eye seems to a fellow when he is about to lose it."
